He won his exhibition with Charles Peterson by a score of 400 to 15, averaging 100 and having a high run of 907 in his third inning. Hoppe started with a single tally, made 21 in his second trip to the table, 807 in his third inning and closed with an unfinished run of 71.

Peterson started with a cipher, made one in his second inning and 14 in his third. Hoppe's long run, while largely a product of line nursing, was varied by occasional shots the length of the table and by spectacular masses.

Baseball fans throughout the country are rejoicing at the return to the game of the popular Christy Mathewson in the role of president of the Boston National League club. When Matty was in his prime as the pitching ace of the Giants he was the idol of the followers of McGraw's team and also was extremely popular with the fans in every city where he appeared on the mound. He was long held up as the model for young players as well as for the rising American generation. His gentlemanly and sportsmanlike tactics aroused universal commendation. These, combined with his many remarkable pitching feats, made him famous not only in the big cities of the National League but also in practically every village and hamlet in this country.

It was a sad day for New York fandom when he was traded to the Reds on July 20, 1916, so that he might become manager of the Cincinnati club. When he returned to the Polo Grounds for his first game as leader of the Reds he received one of the greatest tributes ever paid to a baseball player. He lost none of his extreme popularity with the local fans during his few years in Cincinnati. He enlisted in the Chemical Warfare Service in 1918, and when, in his return from France, he found Pat Moran installed as manager of the Reds, he was welcomed back to the club in the role of assistant manager to McGraw. Because of an attack of tuberculosis he was forced to go to Saranac Lake in June, 1920, and his long and courageous struggle against the disease was observed with widespread interest. After a protracted fight he finally got safely on the road to recovery and he was able to visit his home in Pennsylvania last year and also to come here for the last world's series between the Giants and Yankees at the Polo Grounds.

Matty's return to the game came as a distinct surprise to baseball men, as

the former star pitcher had declared during the National League meeting here last December that his physical condition would not permit him to leave the health resort for any extended period for at least two more years. At any rate, he is now back in the game, and, according to his own assertions and those of his partners in the purchasing syndicate, will take an active hand in the direction of the club. His long experience in baseball should prove to be a splendid asset for the team. The progress of the Braves will be watched with unusual interest this season, and from present indications the club will regain much of its former popularity, now that Matty is at the helm.
