

## FORDS WILL SHIP CARS FROM HERE

Seventy-five Carloads Coming to Saint John for Overseas

One Result of Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star Mission—Hope Example Followed

Seventy-five carloads of Ford automobiles are on their way to this port for shipment overseas, according to an announcement made yesterday. This is one result of the maritime mission of the Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star to Central and Western Canada. The consignment, consisting of 75 cars of automobiles, is coming over the Canadian National lines through Moncton. The Ford Motor Company of Canada signified its willingness to assist in bringing trade to Canadian ports last winter and then announced that so far as possible its goods for overseas would come through Canadian ports. During the time representatives of the Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star were on the mission the Ford people diverted shipments of their products from New London and sent them through Halifax. Now a large shipment is on its way to this port and it is expected that more goods will come this way.

**FOR CANADIAN PORTS.**  
Ford Company officials said that they hoped their example would be followed by other manufacturers of Canada and that all goods made in the Dominion eventually would be shipped through the Canadian ports.

He was a good swimmer and the two swam in the channel for some time and then Bourque went to swim across to the other side. 
