Clause Affecting Ireland Passed in Committee of Whole; Joseph Devlin's Offer; Henderson and Asquith Against **Enforced Service**

London, April 18—When the House of Commons, in committee of the whole, yesterday afternoon reached the clause in the man power bill extending conscription to Ireland, James Lardner, Nationalist M. P. for North Monaghan, moved that the bill should not be enforced with regard to Ireland until the passage of a resolution by the Irish parliament approving it. passage of a resolution by the risk par-liament approving it.
