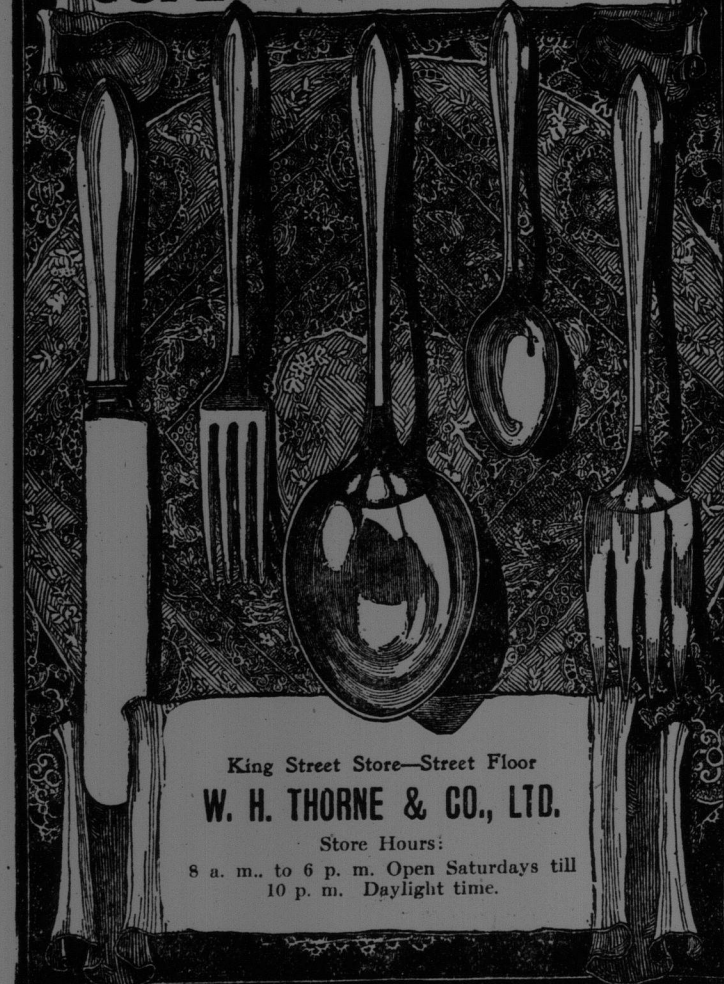

**THE LIBRARY.**  
Commissioner Thornton yesterday made an examination of the free public library to ascertain the extent of repairs required. He said that the roof had been leaking and would require considerable work. The exterior of the building also required attention. He said that the walls inside should also be done over, but that this could hardly be done this year. He also plans some repairs to West Side City Hall.

**THE SWIMMING SCOWS.**  
Commissioner Bullock said this morning that the swimming scows were now being prepared for action and would be placed in position early in June. That on the West Side at the head of Burns. The other scow is to be placed at the foot of Kennedy street, but Jack Redfern who was in charge last year will not be available this season. **FIRE STATION REPAIRS.**  
Extensive repairs are being made to the city and West Side fire stations. At No. 7, West Side, the interior has been done over and the outside will require a coat of paint. The old bell tower on No. 8 H. and L. Portland street, has been done away with and a shingled roof will replace it. The hose tower in this station is to be re-metalled. No. 4 is to get a complete covering of paint on the outside.

## PLANS FOR VISIT OF GENERAL CURRIE

There is great interest in the coming visit of Gen. Sir Arthur Currie to St. John. The general, with Lady Currie and party, have been invited to dine with Premier and Mrs. Foster on arrival from Moncton on Sunday evening. On Monday morning they may visit the military hospitals, but that is not yet decided. The party will lunch on Monday with Lieut. Governor and Mrs. Pugsley at Rotheray. In the afternoon they will be the guests of the mayor on a motor trip. There will be a dinner at the Union Club on Monday evening before the Canadian Club meeting at the Imperial. On Tuesday the general will probably visit the Golf Club, besides attending to military business. It is understood the Women's Canadian Club will have some special entertainment for Lady Currie. Doubtless many citizens will be at the depot to greet the distinguished visitor on Sunday evening. Sir Arthur Currie will be the guest of the Canadian Club of Moncton at supper Saturday evening, and there will be an adjournment to the First Baptist church, where he will deliver an address. Gen. Macdonnell and staff will meet him in Moncton. The veterans of that city will join in the welcome to their former commander.

## ROTHERSAY CADETS' SHOOTING

The second match of the Canadian Rifle League was fired on May 26 by the cadet corps of Rothersay Collegiate School, under Sgt. Major Dooe. The day was a poor one for shooting, as there was a strong, changing wind, but despite this handicap the boys turned in some very good scores.

## Irish Whiskey High.

Dublin, May 28.—The chief secretary for Ireland yesterday received at the Castle a deputation representing the licensed grocers and vintners association who wanted sanction to fix the price of whiskey in the future. It was agreed to fix the price at twenty pence a glass.

## Airdrome For Montreal.

Montreal, May 28.—It is reported that within the next fortnight Montreal will have a fully equipped airdrome at the old Polo grounds on the Bois Franc road, where accommodation for six airplanes will be installed.

## NOTED DOCTOR HERE ON MISSION

Meet G. P. Hospital Staff on Standardization

Relation of the Hospitals to the People—Some Features of the Requirements—He Is Director of American College of Surgeons.

Dr. John G. Bowman of Chicago, director of the American College of Surgeons, is in the city today and this afternoon will meet the staff of the general public hospital to explain to them the features of the standardization of hospitals, a mission on which he is now touring Canada.

To a Times reporter this morning, Dr. Bowman explained the work which he and eight or ten other doctors are carrying out throughout the whole of North America. He said first that the American College of Surgeons was an organization of surgical practitioners in the United States and Canada, numbering about 4,000 members, whose aims were to make the ideals of their profession come true.

He said that there was an equation existing between the hospitals and the general public. The hospital asks the people for financial assistance, good will and support and in return it is expected to give the best possible treatment to the patient. The idea of hospital standardization is an effort to see that the hospitals give the right sort of care to every man, woman or child who enters its doors. It works towards making it possible for doctors to carry out the highest traditions of the profession and bring all hospitals up to the highest standard of efficiency possible. While laying down a set of fundamental principles for the general supervision of the work, however, it does not aim to destroy the individuality either of the institution or the members of its staff.

The doctor said that this fall—probably in October—it was planned to publish a list of the hospitals in America of 100 beds or more which could guarantee good service to the public. Three principal requirements would be demanded of these institutions:—First, that they hold regular staff meetings to analyze the character of the work done during the previous period, taking into consideration the circumstances of each case handled, and drawing whatever lessons are to be derived from the experience of each member of the staff.

Second, the keeping of a case record system, in which the diagnosis, treatment and result of all cases will be included and, Third, the maintenance of an adequate laboratory service, through which all cases can be analyzed.

Speaking of the organization which he represents, Dr. Bowman said that four of the twelve of the governing regents were Canadians—Dr. George E. Armstrong and Dr. Walter W. Chipman of Montreal; Dr. Alexander Primrose of Toronto and Dr. Robert McKechnie of Vancouver. Dr. G. A. B. Addy, Dr. Murray MacLaren and Dr. W. W. White of St. John are fellows of the college.

In the matter of the estate of Elizabeth Martin, personally \$2,500 and realty \$1,238, Julia Martin was appointed administratrix. W. M. Ryan was proctor. Letters testamentary have been granted to Adina Hoyt, executrix under the will of David Churchill, personally \$2,500. B. S. Smith was proctor.

Letters testamentary were also issued to Sarah L. Belyea as executrix under the will of her husband Charles E. Belyea, realty \$1,200, personally \$3,400. K. A. Wilson was proctor.

Hon. W. E. Foster was appointed administrator of the estate of Mary A. King, late of Chance Harbor, personally \$889.30. W. M. Ryan was proctor.

## POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning the names of seventeen prisoners were read out. John J. Griffin was charged with drunkenly driving a horse while under the influence of liquor in Haymarket square and damaging property of McGuire Bros. to the value of \$10. He was also charged by F. C. Wesley with damaging his car. Mr. Wesley said he was driving on the Marsh road last night when he noticed a horse and carriage coming along at furious speed. His wife was driving the car and he told her to give the oncoming team as much room as possible, which she did, but the shaft of the carriage struck as the team was going by and damaged the hood cover. Policeman Totten told of making the arrest and said the man was under the influence of liquor. The case was postponed until next week and the accused was remanded to jail.

Walter Straight, charged with wandering about in Prince William street and not being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, was remanded.

A lad who escaped from the Boys' Industrial Home was arrested and sent back to the home this morning.

John C. Berry, charged with being drunk and impeding pedestrians, was fined \$100 or eleven months in jail. Frank Murphy, arrested on Wednesday night and held for investigation, was charged with stealing two pairs of rubber boots from his boarding house in Germain street. The case was postponed until Monday.

Fourteen men, charged with drunkenness, pleaded guilty and were remanded. One who took ill was taken to the hospital at the conclusion of the court.
