

Dinner to Defence Conference Delegates.

London, Aug. 5.-The delegates to the Imperial Defence Conference were entertained at dinner to-day by the United Service Club, Major-General Arbuthnot presiding. Sir Frederick Borden in reply to the toast to the guests. said that some few years ago the forces of Canada were an unorganized mob.
