Household Brevities.

A wrinkle given by a country woman is that her way of keeping a cut cheese from moulding and spoiling is to wet a piece o' cloth in vinegar and wring it out as dry as possible. Wrap the cut cheese in this damp cloth. Then roll it in paper and keep in a cool place.

Saucepans should always be kept bottom upwards and without their lids. If there is no proper pot-stand, they should project about one inch beyond the shelf or board, so that the air can get to them freely, and thus treated, they never acquire a musty flavour, however long unused.

Closet floors and shelves washed with hot water and cayenne pepper will tend to keep away ants and roaches. Borax and alum may be sprinkled under the shelf paper, or an underlay of tar paper is effective.

Half a dozen ordinary marbles, such as boys play with, bobbing around on the bottom of a kettle of fruit or juice that is being cooked preparatory to jelly or canning, will lessen the amount of stirring necessary to prevent burning.

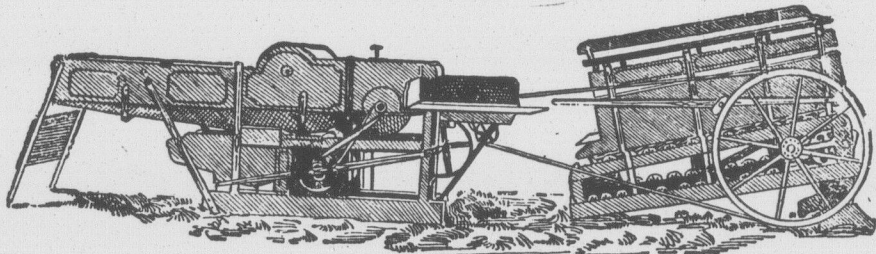
