GIANT BAD BOY THRESHES FATHER.
Then Alfred Price, Jr., Six Feet Tall, Crawled Under the Bed to Hide From a Policeman.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—When Alfred Price, of No. 72 West 105th street, re-monstrated at the dinner table last evening with his fifteen-year-old son, Alfred, Jr., for his incorrigibility, the latter, who is more than six feet tall and of many proportions, jumped from his seat, attacked and beat his father, demolished the dining room service and furniture, and in the most profane terms threatened to set fire to the house, claiming that if a policeman attempted to stop him he would kill him.

Alfred, Sr., dodging the flying glassware and china, ran into the street and implored Policeman Phalen, whom he met, to subdue and arrest the boy. Phalen, who is as much larger than Alfred, Jr., as Alfred, Jr., is than Alfred, Sr., entered Price's home and, after a long search, found the erstwhile pugnacious youth hiding under a bed in his father's bedroom. Crying as if his heart would break, the modern Peck's Bad Boy begged Phalen not to arrest him, but Price, Sr., was stern, and Alfred, Jr., was marched off to the West 105th street station.

The boy's father entered a formal complaint against him, stating that he was wholly unmanageable and vicious. The elder Price urged that his son be placed where he could not wreck the furniture for many days to come. Thereupon Alfred, Jr., was remanded to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

When he heard the decree, Price's son burst into tears. "I'm no kid," he bawled. "I'm a big man and want to be sent to a man's place if I have to be sent anywhere. Children's society! That's the last straw for me."

Alfred will be arraigned this morning in the Children's Court, for although he looks to be twenty-four years old, he is in the eyes of the law a mere child of fifteen.

BRITTLINESS OF GOLD.

It is a well known fact that the presence of very small quantities of foreign substances changes the qualities of metals and their alloys. Gold is no exception to the rule. Admixture with foreign substances often makes it brittle, while otherwise it is the most malleable among the metals. Even if alloyed with pure copper, gold shows these undesirable qualities, and such an alloy cannot be used for jewellery or for other industrial purposes. In 1888 the Paris Mint experimented in order to learn that other metals besides silver and copper could be responsible for a deterioration of gold. It was found that silver and copper are much less

INGENUITY OF SENDING NEWS.

Many Notable Achievements Which Are Placed to the Credit of Old-Time Journalists.

Mr. James Heckscher, the representative of Reuters' agency, who has just retired from the gallery, sent to England the first news of the assassination of President Lincoln, by flinging a tin can containing his message on board the vessel as she was leaving the quay.

Many similar instances of ingenuity in transmitting news occur to memory, both by bygone times and in the present generation. While the late Mr. De Blowitz was a candidate for the position of Paris correspondent of the Times, vacated by Lawrence Oliphant's resignation, a telegram was received in Paris announcing that there had been a coup d'etat in Spain, and that the Prince of the Austrians had been proclaimed king, with the title of Alfonso XII, by Marshal Martinez Campos. The Spanish ambassador in Paris contradicted the story; but De Blowitz, suspecting the truth, managed to get an audience of the new king himself, who was staying with his mother in Paris.

The king gave him details of the coup d'etat. De Blowitz had it all in his mind next morning, and this smart stroke secured him the appointment which led to so many other coups during the years he held that office.

All the old-time journalists had achievements to their credit in the matter of getting first news, and the story of how Archibald Forbes secured for the Daily News the narrative of the survivors of the emigrant ship Copcatric, which was burned on its way to New Zealand, is still remembered in Fleet street. The survivors numbered only three—Macdonald, the second mate, and two ordinary seamen—who had been adrift on a raft for weeks and had sustained life only by cannibalism. The men were sent home by the mail steamer Nymphe, and all Fleet street assembled at Plymouth to interview them on arrival.

But Forbes chartered a tug, waited for the news of the Nymphe, posted the Lizard Light, and went out in advance of all the other journalists, boarded the Nymphe, made a bargain with Macdonald, got the whole story, and left to the other pressmen the two seamen, who were so overcome by their privations that they were quite incoherent.

But there is no need to go back so far to find instances of this kind of enterprise. The only difficulty is that of selection. The Daily Mail has provided various specimens, both before and since its wonderful exclusives at the time of the fall of Pretoria, and on the occasion of its publishing the peace terms, cabled by prearrangement in terms of company promoting when the authorities declined to allow any messages purporting to be about the termination of the war to be put on the cables.

The Daily Mail commenced very earnestly in its career. It had not long been in existence when the wreck of the P. and O. liner Aden, with its terrible loss of life occurred. One boat load of passengers survived, and after many days of suffering they were landed at Aden. How to get their story? Newspapers do not have correspondents at Aden. The Daily Mail called direct to the survivors, telling them the wires were open at its expense for them to cable their full experiences, and the next morning this journal was the only one in the kingdom which had one of the most thrilling sea stories ever related.

The present writer was able to secure for the Evening News the first news of the postponement of the coronation through the king's illness. He had business with a certain official on the morning after His Majesty's arrival in London, within a few days of the great event. He found that official in a state of extreme excitement, just about to make his way to Westminster Abbey to stop the rehearsals then proceeding. By a happy inspiration, which may not even now be disclosed, he was able to delay the official for a quarter of an hour while he got through to the Evening News, enabling that journal to get out first with the intelligence which conveyed dismay through the length and breadth of the empire.

It was in normal conditions disappear that the resourcefulness of the clever journalist gets its full play. When Coule, the Liverpool bank thief, was on trial at the Old Bailey a few years ago, a snowstorm broke down the telegraph and telephone wires and

completely isolated Liverpool, where the interest in the proceedings at the trial was enormous.

Yet one of the evening papers in Liverpool appeared the same afternoon with an excellent report of the day's evidence. How? The cable wires to New York were not broken down, and a thoughtful scribe had sent £100 or £200 in cabling the message from London to New York, whither it was telegraphed back to Liverpool. That journalist had probably remembered the precedent of the Peterhead Correspondent of an Aberdeen paper, confronted by a similar predicament of stagnation wires. The railway, too, was impassable, and he got his news to Aberdeen by cabling it to Norway, whence it came back to London, and to Aberdeen.

Some journalistic enterprise has overreached itself, as in the cases of abbreviated telegrams being amusingly misinterpreted. There is a historic case dating from the early eighties, when Mr. Gladstone referred to Mr. Parnell and his followers as "marching through rapine to the dismembering of the empire." On the same day that Gladstone spoke there was a big horse which was killed, and the words: Veracity, 1; Tyrone, 2; Lobster, 3.

Those items of news were cabled in abbreviated form all over the world, and a New Zealand subeditor did not quite grasp the hang of the intelligence, for the next day's New Zealand papers announced: "Mr. Gladstone in a speech yesterday in London, denounced Mr. Parnell as marching through rapine to the dismembering of the empire."—Answers.
