### WESTFIELD RACES

A motor boat race will be held on Wednesday evening, July 24th, at 7 p. m. This is open to motor boats owned by members of the Westfield Outing Association. In good shape, the prize is a championship pennant. The race will be over course No. 1 as adopted for Class "A" boats. The time limit, 1 hour, 30 minutes. There must be four entries and three starters, or no race.  
Start will be a preparatory gun and flag, and at five minutes later, exactly, the flag lowered and a gun fired as the signal to start. Course best of three boats, no handicap. Entries close at 6 p. m. July 23rd.

A race for Class "B" sailboats will be held on Saturday, August 10th, over no. 2 course, starting at 2:15 p. m. sharp.

The prize is a championship pennant. This race will be open to boats owned and sailed by members of the association, and duly enrolled therein. Time allowance will be given on racing length, as per rules of R. K. Y. C. There are to be four entries and three starters, or no race.

Entries will close at 6 p. m., August 8th, with Secretary of sailing committee.



### THE POPE IS EVIDENTLY JEALOUS OF MARK TWAIN

NEW YORK, July 10.—A cable despatch to the American from Rome says—The Pope who is well known for his while age to have his portrait painted good nature, was persuaded a little when the artist showed it to him he begged his holiness, as an additional favor, to select a few words as an inscription. The pope wrote "John, 6-24." When the friends of the artist looked up the passage, they found the words, "It is I, be not afraid."
