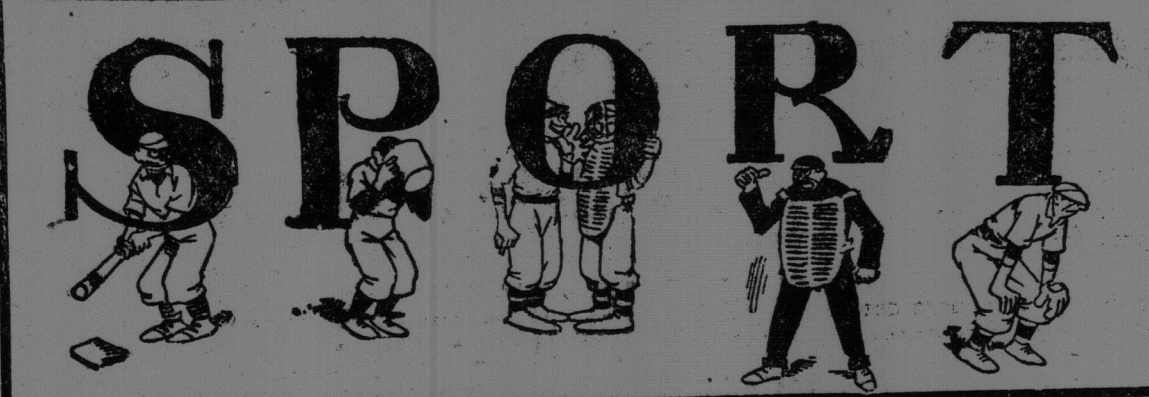
HAPPY HALF HOUR OPENS MAY 24TH.

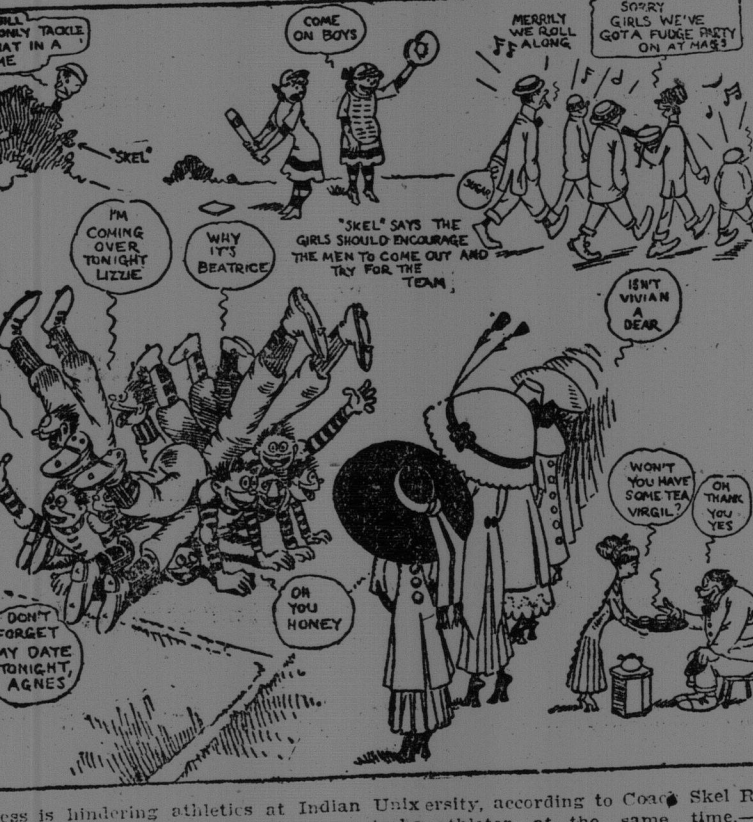
