AN INSANE WOMAN

Shot a Policeman and Tried to Drown Her Baby in a Tub. She Was Finally Subdued by the Fumes of Turpentine—Used a Revolver Freely.

BOSTON, Sept. 4-In a sudden fit of insanity today Mrs. Minnie McKenzie tried to kill her husband at her home, 121 Falcon street, East Boston, shot and fatally wounded Patrolman Alfred M. Sturtevant, and barricading herself in the front room of her tenement for several hours stood off a squad of ten policemen. It was not until nine o'clock that the police were able to capture the woman. Findings in all efforts to invade the room futile, a supply of turpentine was brought to the house and Mrs. McKenzie was stupefied by the fumes. On her person were found two revolvers of heavy calibre and a large quantity of cartridges.

It is said that Mrs. McKenzie, who is 34 years of age, and of powerful frame, had been an inmate of an insane asylum. She became violently insane about 2.30 o'clock this afternoon, and drawing a revolver of a heavy calibre beat shooting at her husband, but none of the shots took effect. McKenzie notified the police, and four patrolmen were sent to the house.

When they arrived they found Mrs. McKenzie seated at a front room, where she had locked the door and barricaded it with a large bureau. The officers succeeded in getting the door partially opened, but not wide enough to enter. The woman then pushed the muzzle of her revolver through the door and fired four shots, three of the bullets striking Patrolman Sturtevant and one of them lodging in the chest, between the abdomen and the third in the left temple. Sturtevant was removed to the Relief Hospital, where he died at 7.20 o'clock tonight.

The news of the shooting of Patrolman Sturtevant attending to the removal of Sturtevant to the hospital the police station for assistance and seven more men were sent to the house. The officers were ordered to capture the woman without injuring her.

Mrs. McKenzie after shooting Sturtevant barricaded her door again and strengthened her defences. The police made repeated attempts to dislodge her, but every sound of a voice or footstep in the hall was the signal for a fusillade of shots from the front room, the bullets passing through the barricaded door.

The news of the shooting of Patrolman Sturtevant spread rapidly, and during the entire afternoon and evening the street in the vicinity of McKen- zie's house was crowded with peo- ple without inquiring why.

Patrolman Sturtevant was 44 years old and married. He had been con- nected with the Boston police depart- ment since 1888.

On the evening Police Inspec- tor William Rooney tried to parley with the woman, but she thrust a re- volver through a crack in the door and fired. The bullet passed between chest, but as she had not been in- jured, she was not wounded. His hand was burned by the explosion. After firing at Inspector Rooney, the crowd which blocked the street became the subject of a riot. The latest report is estimated that nearly 5,000 were in the vicinity of the house. Raising the windows she fired several shots into the crowd and then turned her at- tention to the superintendent of police, who would shoot into the crowd, but so far as known no one in the street was wounded.

Finding that all attempts to induce the woman to surrender were futile the police brought a quantity of tur- pentine to the house shortly before nine o'clock. Fumes of the turpentine were blown into the room which Mrs. McKenzie occupied. A few moments later the frenzied woman sank to the floor in a stupor. The of- ficers then rushed in and seized her.

Two large revolvers and a quantity of cartridges were recovered. In her clothing she was locked up in the East Boston police station.

Mrs. McKenzie is the wife of Ed- ward McKenzie, who is employed in a box factory. She is the mother of three children, the youngest an infant daughter. Her insanity showed itself today when she tried to drown the baby in a wash tub. The husband and neighbors interfered and Mrs. McKenzie took the child away from the house. Mrs. McKenzie then began firing her revolver promiscuously and attempted to drown her baby in a bathtub.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs. Chas. C. Scammell Stricken With Death When Saying Good Bye to Her Sister.

A large circle of relatives and friends were shocked Monday by news of the death of Mrs. Chas. C. Scammell, which occurred with startling sudden- ness in the morning at her home, where she had returned from the station, where she had been bidding good-bye to her sister, Mrs. Walter Scammell, who, af- ter leaving her home, was leaving for New York by the latest train.

Before leaving her home on Orange street yesterday morning, Mrs. Scam- mell complained of a pain in her chest, but as she had been in good health nothing was seri- ously feared. After leaving the station to return home the pain sud- denly became worse and when she reached her home she collapsed. Dr. J. H. Scammell was called, but be- fore he could arrive she was dead. Death was due to heart fail- ure.

Mrs. Scammell was a daughter of the late George P. Sanborn. Her moth- er, who resides in this city, is ninety- four years of age. Of the family to which Mrs. Scammell belonged the following survive: J. P. Sanborn, of the deputy receiver general's office; Mrs. Brown, now residing in New York, widow of the late Dr. Brown, former- ly of Woodstock; Mrs. Eaton, a widow, residing in Boston; Walter Scammell, of New York, who left St. John this morning; Mrs. David Vaughan, of Liverpool, England, whose husband be- longed to the well known shipping firm; Mrs. James Henderson, who is dead, formerly a member of the firm of Henderson Brothers, of Liverpool, has retired from business, and now re- sides at Yarmouth; Mr. Scammell, who is the mother of Mrs. Palmer, widow of the late James E. Palmer. The late Mrs. James E. Whitaker was another sister.

Leaves her husband, Mrs. Scammell had three daughters. The youngest, one was married not long ago to Cap- tain Geoghan, of the British army in India, and the other, Miss Annie Scammell, resides at home.

NOVA SCOTIAN KILLED IN TORONTO.

TORONTO, Sept. 3.-R. H. Kennedy, aged about forty, cattle drover, of Haldon, Nova Scotia, was run over by a Belt Line night car and instantly killed on Spadina avenue, between Phoebe and Sullivan streets, about one o'clock this morning. The car was going south at a rapid rate and the wheels passing over the body before the motor man could apply the brakes. It was evident that Kennedy was lying prone across the tracks, and did not notice the approach of the car.

Decceased registered at the Little Union Hotel yesterday morning, and took breakfast, but had not been seen since. He was in charge of a consign- ment of cattle from Winnipeg belong- ing to Gordon, Ironside & Fairs of that place.

The police are on the look out for a man named Russell, who accompanied him. The body is at the morgue.

BIBLES FOR CANADA

Are Printed in Twenty-Sev- en Different Languages. A Most Interesting Account of the Work Being Done Here by the British Society.

IN view of the forthcoming visit to Canada of the Rev. John H. Ritson, M. A., secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is interesting to recall the work that is being accomplished in British North Amer- ica through the instrumentality of the Bible Society. During the past twelve months, from August 1st to August 1st, 1904, no less than 8,318 volumes were shipped to Canada from the Bible house in London, and, in order to dis- seminate the demand for the scriptures is on the decline. It may be mentioned that as recently as Aug. 16th, an order was received in London from Montreal for 3,412 copies, while on Aug. 17th an order was received from Toronto for a consignment of 21,628 copies. And further, an interest- ing light is thrown on the variety of nationalities and of one nation, some of whose scriptures are to be found in New- foundland and Vancouver by the fact that these scriptures represented 26 different languages, including such tongues as Japanese, Russ and Finn, and the demand for the scriptures is on the increase. In Winnipeg, for a Chinese Sunday school at Halifax, N. S. Special importations of scriptures in Ruthen- ian, Hungarian and other foreign languages have been made by the use of Doukhobors, Galicians, etc. in the Northwest Territories.
