

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 26--- The annual report of the Postmaster General covering the last fiscal year, shows that the number of letters and post cards handled in the mails during the year increased 19,—805,000, or over four per cent, as compared with the preceding twelve months. The number of post offices increased by 656, and there was an increase of 2,034 miles in extent of surference which miles in extent of system over which mails were carried. The revenue of departmenf for the year was \$809,237 in excess of expenditure. The stamp issue totalled \$9,916,011, an increase of \$530,on the St. Stephen train Monday.
