News Summary.

DOMINION. — Indians killed twenty three fine porpoise of the whistling, North Head, Grand Manan, a few days ago. — A fire at Hantsport early Wednesday morning, destroyed the boiler factory and machine shop of Messrs. E. Bell, of New Glasgow, was elected vice-president for Nova Scotia, and Benjamin Wright, of Charlottetown, vice-president for P. E. Island. — North Shore oysters are now in such demand that C. S. Bremner, of Noble's Village, who shipped 300,000 barrels last winter and autumn, says he cannot find enough to fill his orders. He sent a buyer to Cape Breton to ascertain what can be done there. — A shipment of 130,000 yards of cotton cloth was sent forward from the Kingston cotton mills over the Canada Pacific railway for China last week. The total export of cotton to China from the Kingston mill during the past twelve months was two million yards. — Sch. Jessie D., Bulwer, master, sailed from Parrabara, on Wednesday, 21st inst., with coal for St. John. On Monday night, 25th inst., she arrived at Parrabara on her return trip and was aground and damaged at St. John's. This is the second time that the schooner has been wrecked in the winter season. The wreck at Parrabara is still as open as it was in July and there appears to be no immediate prospect of navigation closing.—Hants Journal.
