HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER GETS HALF PAY WHILE AWAY WITH THE OVERSEAS CONTINGENT

Board of School Trustees Recognize Patriotism—Overcrowding in the Schools to be Matter of Investigation—Other Business of a Routine Nature.

A meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held last night, those present being: R. B. Emerson, chairman; Superintendent Bridges, and trustees Russell, Day, Nagle, Manning, Ingraham, Mrs. Dever and Mrs. Taylor. The secretary, A. Gordon Leavitt, and Trustee Officer McManis were also present.

The chairman read a letter from J. Harvey Brown, written on behalf of the Deaf and Dumb Institution, West End, asking the board to grant facilities for the education in manual training of two or three of the inmates. The request was referred to the committee on manual training and the superintendent, Dr. Bridges, with power to act. The chairman also read a letter from M. A. McMurty of Toronto, having reference to the encouragement of thrift amongst school children by collecting small sums from them and banking them for their benefit. It was pointed out that owing in part to the difficulty of collection payments had not been kept up by the pupils.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR SUNDAY MEETING

Recruiting Committee adds to its members at meeting last night.

At the meeting of the citizens' recruiting committee held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms it was announced that the speakers at Imperial Theatre next Sunday would be Judge Carleton and W. S. Fisher. C. B. Lockhart was appointed chairman of the returned soldiers' committee. It was agreed that soldiers returning from the front should have a cordial greeting on arrival in the city, and that, instead of being left their own resources they should be met by representatives of a committee who would attend to their immediate wants, if any, and register their names and addresses with the object of finding early employment in cases where it should be found necessary. It was also agreed that in the case of wounded and invalided men efforts should be made by the returned soldiers' committee to place them in comfortable quarters until they are convalescent. The general committee met last evening with Col. Sturdee presiding. The following were added to the recruiting committee: J. M. Robinson, W. C. Allison, E. E. Church, W. Mahoney, M. E. Asar, W. C. THE PREMIER WILL ARRIVE HERE AT NOON

Will be met at station by citizens—Two bands to escort him.

Sir Robert L. and Lady Borden will, it is expected, arrive here on the Montreal train at 12:30 this afternoon. They will be met at the Union depot by members of the Canadian Patriotic Fund executive, the citizens' recruiting committee, members of the executive of the Women's Canadian Club and others. The Premier and Lady Borden will be guests of Hon. J. D. Hazen and Mrs. Hazen whilst here.

It is anticipated that a large number of citizens will be present to welcome the visitors at the depot. The City Cornet and Carleton Cornet bands will be in attendance as an escort. In the afternoon Lady Borden will be tendered a reception at the Mayor House, Glen Falls, by the Women's Canadian Club, and guests to the reception are advised to take a car from Haymarket Square to Glen Falls not later than four o'clock. Sir Robert and Lady Borden will, it is understood, leave for Halifax tonight by the late train.
