Directors of Ontario Jockey

Club Will Permit Running

of the King's Plate.

The usual 154 game schedule has
been announced by the National Leag-
ue for the season of 1918. Play will
open on Tuesday, April 16 and close
on Saturday, October 5. The opening
games will see Boston playing at Phil-
adelphia, Brooklyn at New York, Pitts-
burgh at Cincinnati and Chicago at St.
Louis. There are but two conflicting
dates when the schedule is compared
with that of the American League.
Both occur at Chicago, where the Chi-
cago National and the Chicago Ameri-
can will entertain opponents on their
home ground on June 23 and Septem-
ber 1.
Saturday and holiday dates have been
apportioned equitably, the clubs shar-
ing about equally in the distribution
of home and abroad fixtures. Pitts-
burgh has the largest number of Sat-
urdays at home, fourteen of these
week-end contests being allotted to the
Pirates. Cincinnati has eighteen Sun-
days at home and none abroad. Bos-
ton secures four holiday dates, three
at home and one abroad. In other re-
spects the clubs are placed upon a
share-and-share-alike basis.

MANY ATHLETES FOR

LONG SNOWSHOE RACE.

Not only Montreal athletes, but
snowshoers from Ottawa, Three Riv-
ers, Sherbrooke, Quebec, Joliette, St.
Johns and Sorel will take part in a
ten-mile snowshoe race to be staged by
Nations next Sunday. The event
starts at one o'clock in front of Lam-
or's hotel, at St. Laurent, to finish at
the new clubhouse of the National A.
A. club, Sherbrooke street. The line to
travel will be from Lamor's hotel, fol-
lowing the road up to Lunkins hotel at
Cote des Neiges, then continuing
on the same road to the Brunet marble
works, at this point taking the hill
which leads to Park Slide, there going
around the mountain to the right up to
the reservoir, taking Pine Ave. to St.
Denis street, turning to the left to Roy
street, to Lafontaine Park, around La-
fontaine Park by Rachel, Papineau,
Sherbrooke, Cherrier to the club house.

Each competitor must wear a snow-
shoe uniform, only ordinary club snow-
shoes will be accepted, and competi-
tors must not only be registered as
amateurs, but present their amateur
cards at the start. The National A.
A. snowshoe section gives a silver
trophy to the winner, which must be
won four times. A club cup is also
given to the four first competitors of
the club. Gold, silver and bronze
medals will also be given.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 13.—Though rac-
ing in general has been suspended in
Canada since July last there will be
no break in the continuous running of
the King's Plate, the oldest fixture on
the American continent. That was de-
cided yesterday when the Ontario
Jockey Club directors granted the use
of Woodbine to the Toronto hunt for
an open-air horse show in May and to
permit the running of the King's Plate.
The purse of \$3,000 in addition to the
fifty guineas donated by His Majesty
will be given by the Ontario Jockey
Club which will receive no revenue of
any kind in return for the disburse-
ment.
No other races than the Plate will be
allowed at the show nor will betting
be in any way sanctioned or permitted
on the premises.
