

PEOPLE OF MONTENEGRO WOULD GET RID OF THEIR KING

Peter's Policy Not in Harmony With the Opinions of Some of His Politicians—Royal Family Seems to be Divided Against Itself.

Paris, Dec. 9.—According to a telegram from Agron, relayed from Zurich and published here by the Intrants, the King of Montenegro has been deposed as a result of a meeting of the Montenegrin National Assembly held in Podgoritz last Sunday. The despatch states that after examining the political and economical interests of the country, the National Assembly unanimously voted for the deposition of the king, and the whole Petrovitch dynasty, and for the union of Montenegro with Serbia under Karaogoritch dynasty, as the common fatherland of the people, known under three names of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes. A further resolution was passed approving the election of a National Council to deal with affairs of reunification of Serbia and Montenegro. King Nicholas of Montenegro, one of whose daughters married the King of Italy, has been living in Neully, just outside the walls of Paris, since his arrival in France as a refugee, after his country was overrun by the invading enemy, and is in receipt of a substantial pension from the Allied governments. It will be remembered that after the flight of Nicholas, out of his sons took refuge in Austria, while the other remained in an Allied camp. This curious position in the Montenegrin royal family has been the cause of much speculation in Paris during the past year or two, and in view of the fact that some of the leading politicians who have also taken refuge were known to be in strong opposition to the policy pursued by their king, the announcement of his deposition has caused little surprise in Paris.

VEIL OF SECRECY HAS BEEN LIFTED FROM "HUSH" SHIPS

Combination of Great Speed and Heavy Guns With Light Draft—How Navy Grew in War—Score of Magnificent Vessels Added to Fleet by Construction, Purchase or Appropriation.

London, Dec. 9.—The names of twenty additions to the British battleship squadron which have joined the Grand Fleet since August, 1914, have been mentioned in newspaper articles since the signing of the armistice, according to a resume published today. Four of the vessels have been known as the "hush" ships, because of the secrecy surrounding their design and construction. They are reported as the Repulse, Courageous, Glorious and Frivoltus. They are reported to be nearly 800 feet in length and to displace 30,000 tons each, and to be capable of a speed of from thirty to thirty-five knots. They were completed within a year. A combination of great speed and heavy armament on a comparatively light draught permitted them to use the shallow waters of the North Sea. The Emperor of India and the Benbow of the Iron Duke class (25,000 tons) were two other of the vessels. They belong to the 1911-1912 programme, as did also the battle cruiser Tiger. The five vessels of the Queen Elizabeth class (27,500 tons) the Barham, the Valiant, the Warspite, the Malaya and the Queen Elizabeth, which were in the program for 1912-13, are also among the additions. In the battleship programme for 1913-1914 there were five vessels, which in armament and armor were to resemble the Queen Elizabeth, but their displacement was to be slightly smaller. They are all in the feet and are the Royal Sovereign, Royal Oak, Resolution, Revenge, and Ramillies (25,750 tons). Other additions were warships purchased and appropriated in Great Britain for Chile, and were to be named the Almirante Latorre and Almirante Cochrane. The Almirante Latorre (25,000 tons), is believed to be the vessel christened by Mrs. Pake, wife of the then American ambassador, last June, as the Eagle.

FIND SAFE GAS FOR BALLOONS

Product of Texas Wells Will Not Explode or Burn—Now Being Produced on Large Scale.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Discovery of an inert, non-inflammable gas, suitable for use in balloons, dirigibles and other lighter aircraft, was revealed by the navy department today in a statement explaining expenditures now being made jointly with the army for its production. The department said the use of this new gas, known as "argon," will eliminate the hazard of fire and explosion that always has accompanied balloon operations. The hydrogen has been used to inflate the gas bags. The gas from which "argon" is obtained comes from wells at Petrolia, Texas, owned by the Lone Star Gas Company, the statement said, and a ten inch pipe line, to cost \$1,050,000, is being laid for a distance of 34 miles from the wells to a plant at North Fort Worth, where the gas will be compressed into cylinders for shipment to the balloon fliers. INTENSELY INTERESTING STORY OF ARCHANGEL EXPEDITION

Practically All the Allied Nations Are Represented in the Contingent Engaged in Maintaining Order in Northern Russia—Very Little Fighting as Yet—Supplies Plentiful and Health of the Men is Good.

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—A cable from the overseas military authorities to the director of public information states that the Canadian contingent engaged in Northern Russia consists of three parties. The first and third parties are engaged in training and leading the local forces raised in Archangel and Murmansk and in administrative duties. The second party forms part of the Allied expeditionary force operating from the White Sea, including, in addition to British and Canadian contingents, American, French and Russian troops whose object is to protect the Russian people from the ravages of the Bolsheviks and to maintain the status of the Allies. The following extracts from the diary of an officer serving with the Canadians gives a good idea of the nature of the campaign: "October 4th—Starting loading guns and vehicles on barges and reported to move at 11 a. m. Salting postponed until 2 p. m., as no tugs had shown up. GERMANY HOPES TO RETAIN HER ARMY AS A THREAT TO THE ALLIES

Paris (Dec. 9)—Paris is convinced that it is the intention of the German commanders to preserve an army, of reduced numbers perhaps, but sufficient to be a menace to peace in Europe; to accumulate sufficient stocks of foodstuffs to enable Germany to hold out for a long time; and to use the armistice as a means of delay, to enable them to enter into discussion with the Allies before the whole conditions of the armistice have been accepted. It is known that an important interchange of views has been going on between Washington and various Allied capitals since the armistice was signed, and the news fact that President Wilson is now on the ocean will make no difference in view of the fact that the values to which he is selling in the world with the most elaborate wireless plant in existence.

Lloyd George is Out for Votes of the Women

London, Dec. 9.—Premier Lloyd George, at a great meeting in Albert Hall today, made an appeal for the votes of the women. The meeting was held exclusively by women, and it being unique in that end other ways. The guard of honor was made up of members of the various uniformed women's organizations. The Premier stated that between six million and seven million women would have a direct influence on the legislation of the future, which was largely depend on how they voted. "If you suspect any man of going to the peace conference with war in his heart," said the Premier, "vote against him. The coming peace must be a peace of honor, and not a peace of expediency. MANY TROOPS ARRIVE HERE THIS WINTER

Officials Assured S. E. Elkin, M. P., That at Least Half of the Returning Soldiers Will Disembark at St. John.

S. E. Elkin, M.P., who returned yesterday from Ottawa, brought with him the news that in all probability there would pass through the port of St. John during the winter port season nearly one hundred thousand troops. He had taken the matter up with Hon. Mr. Cleburn, minister of militia, and Hon. Mr. Reid, minister of railways, and placed before them the advantages of this port for the handling of troops. He pointed out that not only had St. John facilities not possessed by other ports, but that the additional feature of being several hours nearer the west than other ports, and had two railways available for the rushing of troops to their homes in the quickest possible time. The force of his argument was seen by the ministers, particularly in the light of the recent landings at a sister port, and Mr. Elkin was practically assured that at least one-half the returning troops would pass through this port. Mr. Elkin also brought good news in regard to the shipbuilding program of the government. It had been decided to let down the bars and allow Canadian yards to build for the world, under the supervision of the minister of marine. This concession means that Canadian yards will now be able to accept orders from Allied governments for steel ships and will likely result in the establishment of several new yards, as those governments have been wanting to place orders for ships for some time. Another step which the minister of marine had under serious consideration and would probably adopt, was the selling of the ships now under construction in the Canadian yards, and the placing of new orders for ships to take their places, thus giving the men who had embarked on this new industry an opportunity to build more ships at the prevailing high prices, and give them a better chance to get established on a firm basis. In regard to Union government Mr. Elkin was inclined to think the reports being sent out about the probable collapse of the government were exaggerated.

TELLS OF DEATH OF SERGT. JOHN CALDWELL

Apoahqui, Dec. 9.—A letter has been received recently by Mrs. John Caldwell of this place from Lieut. H. V. Little, stating some particulars of the death of her son, Sergt. John Caldwell, who was killed in action October 6, 1918. The letter is as follows: France, Nov. 1st, 1918. Dear Mrs. Caldwell: I have been away from the battalion for nearly two weeks and have only just received your address from our battalion orderly room or I should have written to you sooner. Possibly some of the others in the company have written to you regarding your son, Sergt. J. Caldwell. However I feel I must write to you of my most sincere sympathy in your loss. It was a terrible blow to me as I had only just taken the platoon of which he was platoon sergeant, and I had been talking to him not half an hour before the shelling commenced, during which he was killed. However, I am glad to say he did not suffer any pain or agony as death was instantaneous. You have no idea how he is missed in our company, as he was absolutely the best sergeant in the company, in fact in the whole battalion, always right up to the mark in all his work, and one of the bravest fellows I ever knew. I am sure we will never get his equal in the battalion. Again let me assure you of my sincerest sympathies. I am yours sincerely, LIEUT. H. V. LITTLE.
