Police Court

Yesterday

Stowaways Will be Sent Back to West Indies — Two Charges of Statutory Offence Heard — Mallory's Alleged Private Still Case Heard.

The number of cases disposed of in the police court yesterday was an unusually large one, and the charges laid covered a wide field.

Two stowaways from the S. S. Canadian Gunner were remanded (till the sailing of the ship when they will be sent to the West Indies.

Albert Sullivan and Alma Edmondson, who were arrested on a statutory offence, owing to allegations made by Christine Collins, the girl who was found lying in the snow near on Wharf, Monday evening, were dismissed by the court as the evidence brought out did not support the charge. J. A. Barry appeared for the defence.

William McAtteer charged with assaulting his wife, was fined \$20 and compelled to enter into a recognizance of \$200 to keep the peace.

Another wife beating case was postponed for one month, the husband and wife have separated for that period.

William McAtteer was fined \$50 for having liquor in his possession contrary to his private dwelling.

Stanley Briscoe who was charged with a statutory offence, was sent up for trial after evidence had been given by a young colored girl at the afternoon session of the police court. S. B. Gerow is defending the case.

Thomas Mallory who was charged under the Inland Revenue Act with having a still in his possession for the manufacturing of intoxicating liquor, pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Policeman Gibbs gave evidence of having gone with Officer Grant to a barn in Stanley street on Jan. 2nd shortly after the arrest of the defendant on a drunkenness charge. There they found a still consisting of a wash boiler with a tube running through it, and connected to a milk can which sat on an oil store. The contents of the can were still warm.

In a wagon outside they found a bottle containing liquid. The witness added that the bottle was attached to the small end of the tube to collect the spirit distilled and the boiler was full of cold water. The still was seized by the police, and on Friday afternoon at two o'clock the defendant allowed out on his own recognizance. G. Earl Logan appeared for the Department of Inland Revenue.

PROMINENT CITIZEN DIED YESTERDAY

Francis McCafferty Had Been Ill for Three Years—Was Formerly in Dry Goods Business and a Leading Resident in the City.

It was with deep regret that the many friends of Francis McCafferty learned of his death which occurred in the St. John Infirmary yesterday morning. Mr. McCafferty had not been in the best of health for the past three years and was taken to the infirmary a few days ago.

He was a prominent citizen and beloved by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. For a number of years he was president and a leading spirit in the Irish Friendly Society, an organization not large in numbers but much in evidence from 1860 on ward, and he took a prominent part in all its activities. His dramatic club, which contained Mr. McCafferty, John C. Ferguson, Wm. Nannery, John McWilliams, James Coll and others, has never been excelled since, if equalled, and Mr. McCafferty was amongst the foremost performers. Few men of his day were as well informed on Irish affairs, then as much to the front as now, and he was always active in every local effort to aid the cause "at home."

When the late Justin McCarthy visited St. John Mr. McCafferty presided in the Meagher Institute, later the York Theatre, on Monday evening, Oct. 25, 1886. Born in Carleton in 1844, and self educated, Mr. McCafferty learned the dry goods business and was employed by Doherty and McTavish, and other large concerns, afterwards going into on his own with James B. Daly, on King street. In recent years he was engaged in other pursuits. During his long life in St. John he took a lively interest in politics, being a consistent Liberal from start to finish, and in provincial and civic affairs, too, he maintained continued interest. A good citizen with hosts of friends in every walk of life and no ostentatious kind-heartedness, with a keen sense of humor, his death will be deeply regretted.

Mr. McCafferty is survived by his wife (formerly Miss Cline) and nine children. The sons are: Frank I. City Editor of the Times; George T. City Editor of the Times; composing room staff; B. P. managing editor of the New Freeman; Gerald R. in Virginia, and Herbert G. of the staff of the Los Angeles Times, Los Angeles, Cal. The daughters are: Edith, Matron of the Manitoba Military Hospital, Winnipeg, now on her way home; Mrs. Foster H. Smith, of Lowell, Mass.; Mrs. William Barrill, of Bangor, and Miss Gertrude H. of the Telegraph and Times business staff. There are also several grandchildren.
