### SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Russell Stevenson Goes Down Whilst Bathing and Fails to Rise.

The club house at Riverside Park, usually a place of pleasure these hot evenings, was last night turned suddenly into a port of gloom. About 8 o'clock, when many of the boys were bathing Russell Stevenson, son of Mr. Wm. Stevenson, High street, joined the throng and went in for a bath. Although not a strong swimmer, little attention was paid to him, as he was a big strong boy for his age (16), and all seemed to be enjoying the water after a very hot day. Suddenly Stevenson was seen to go down, without a word, and as he did not come up again, his comrades became alarmed and shouted for help. There were dozens of good swimmers near by, and the war canoe crew had just landed, and immediately there was a plunge into the waters to find the missing boy. But the efforts of the swimmers were of no avail, and grappling irons and poles were brought into use and after an hour and a quarter the body was brought to the surface. It is thought that the young fellow was seized with heart failure which caused him to go down so quickly and not rise again. The remains were taken to the club house, and later removed to Patterson Bros.' undertaking rooms.

Russell was a fine healthy boy, of good character and most popular with those who knew him. He came here last year with his parents from Fitzroy, and was becoming acquainted with the young people when the unfortunate accident befell him. The parents have the fullest sympathy of the whole town in their bereavement. The funeral is fixed for to-morrow morning to the C.P.R. train for Pakenham and thence to Fitzroy.
