TRUE PERSONAL LIBERTY

To The Editor:—One of the characteristic phrases of prohibition generally is to promote the impression that any one opposed to it does not walk uprightly or work righteousness, forgetting that, "the wicked flee when no man pursueth, but the righteous are bold as a lion."

Freedom can only be won by liberation from the bondage of illusion. A restraint of natural liberty, not necessary or expedient for the public, is tyranny or oppression. A philosopher tells us that the liberty of one depends not so much upon the removal of all restraint from him, as on the due restraint upon the liberty of others.

At the nomination on the 13th inst. some of the candidates manifested their absolute intention to "vote four times wet" or "four times dry." This was quite proper, so their supporters knew just exactly where to find them at least on this particular question.

Of course any principle that has for its vital intention, the benefit of mankind and the elevating of the human race, ought to be regarded just in proportion as its influence is effective. It is announced with considerable gloat, that in Kansas, or at least liberal portions of the state, that prohibition has been in vogue for thirty years, or about one generation. Now if the manifest effect were so striking in this instance, on those who are said to enjoy the favor, it is surely not too much to ask for an illustration.

It is fact, even in an ordinary community, where prohibition is extant, (that is here at home) the female part of the population is no handsomer nor more attractive, than the male portion any stronger, healthier, more active or reliable, than where liberty reigns supreme.

Now our prohibition friends will kindly keep in mind that we contend that temperance in all things is requisite, but when a portion of the community undertake to force their particular whim or doctrine down the throats of the remaining part of the community by force of law it becomes an intolerable extreme.

When the Redeemer was on earth it may be observed that, although he always advocated and recommended the adoption of good courses, yet he never requested the assistance of force in the establishing of his propositions. The Divine plan was to present the scheme and then leave the acceptance or rejection entirely in the hands of his audience, no force of law was required, because it was just the same two thousand years ago as it is to-day.

Men made by this means are dabby, and void of the metal that makes a man, but a man at liberty, that accepts the truth, of his own volition, (and this is the right way to make men). You may depend on having a man with the material in him, to be of never failing value to both church and state.
