NEWMAN HALL DETERMINED TO AGAIN BEAT KITCHENER
Despite Newman Hall's lowly position in the group race, there promises to be a large attendance at Saturday night's game between the locals and Kitchener. The ticket sale opened yesterday and already many of the pastebards have been disposed of. The fans evidently realize that Newman Hall have been more outlived than outplayed this season, and many expect that they will again take the Allan Cup holders. In case the champions are defeated the chances of the St. Patrick's to win the group title would be greatly enhanced.

Newman Hall are leaving nothing undone in their efforts to be in the best of condition for this important fixture. The players and management are anxious to show the fans that they are a formidable team, but, aside from this, they are desirous that St. Patrick's win, the group and will do everything in their power to assist them. Jerry Laflamme predicted yesterday that his team would again take a fall out of the Allan Cup holders, and, judging by the form displayed when the teams last met, his optimism seems justified.

The champions are now at the top of their form and are determined to overhaul St. Patrick's and retain their laurels. Merrick has replaced Karges on the defense and the change has been all for the better, while Hiller and Parkes have their combination play down to perfection.

OTTAWA OUTPLAYS CANADIENS BY 7-0
Capitals Secure Firm Grip on Pro League's Leadership.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—Defeating Canadiens in a brilliant match at the Arena here last night Eddie Gerard's Ottawa Senators tightened their grip on the championship of the second half of the National Hockey League schedule and incidentally showed the "Flying Frenchmen" down into third position. After a match that was replete with spectacular play and which gave the Ottawas an opportunity of giving the grandest display they have offered this season, the home team skated off the ice victorious by the decisive score of 7 to 0. Canadiens met their most humiliating defeat of the season, as they were outplayed, outskated and outgeneraled by the Ottawas, who thus secured their revenge for the defeat sustained in last week's match at Montreal. A crowd of about 6,000 persons cheered the Ottawas on to victory tonight and from the form shown by the Senators they looked good enough to capture the Eastern honors and to play at the coast for the world's honors and the Stanley cup.

HAL CHASE IS "NOT GUILTY"
New York, Feb. 13.—Hal Chase, first baseman of the Cincinnati National League Club, was to-day acquitted of the charge of attempting to influence the result of baseball games last summer.

President John A. Heydler, of the league, rendered the decision after a week of study of the evidence submitted by the officers of the club and that offered by Chase in rebuttal. "The testimony showed," said Heydler, "that Chase acted in a foolish and careless manner both on the field and among the players and that the club was justified in bringing the charges in view of the many rumors which arose from the loose talk of its first baseman. Chase did not take his work seriously and was entirely to blame for the position in which he found himself. There was, however, no proof that he intentionally violated or attempted to violate the rules in relation to tampering with players or in any way endeavored to secure desired results in the outcome of games."

SENIORS MEET NEWMAN HALL TOMORROW NIGHT

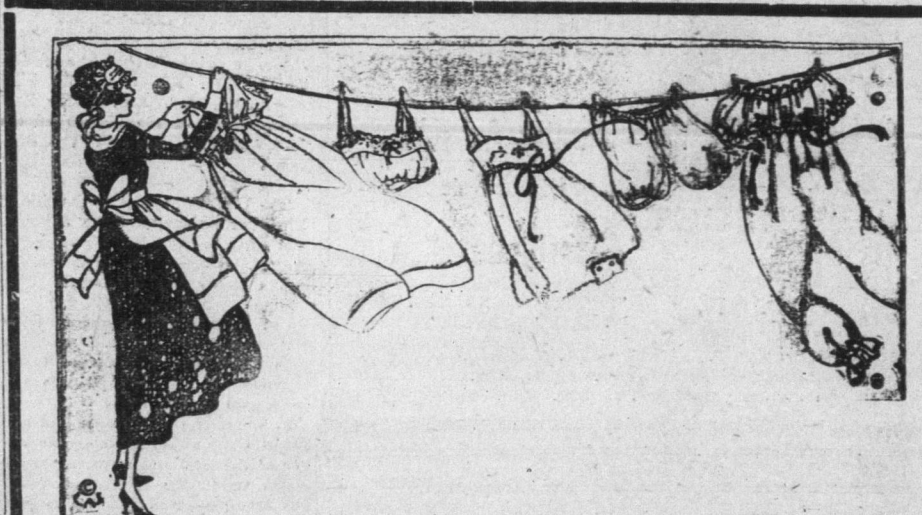
Toronto will see another real game tomorrow when the local Seniors come against Newman Hall.
