THE LESSON EXPLAINED

Time and Place-Friday, April 7, A.D. 30, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; Calvary, outside the north wall of Jerusalem.

Connecting Links-When Pilate had delivered Jesus to be crucified and caused Him to be scourged, the soldiers took Him away to their own quarters, and there, having stripped Him of His own garments, robed Him in scarlet, put a crown of thorns on His head and a reed in His hand for a sceptre, and offered Him mock homage as the king of the Jews. Then they spat upon Him, and beat His head with the reeds. Afterwards they led Him away to be crucified. As they were going to the place of crucifixion, they met one Simon of Cyrene whom they compelled to bear the cross of Jesus. (See Matt. 27:27-32 and v. 21.)

V. 22. They bring him ; that is, the Roman soldiers, under the command of a centurion. The procession passed through the streets of Jerusalem, Jesus wearing the crown of thorns (vs. 17-20) and carrying, according to the usual custom, the two pieces of wood out of which His cross was to be made (John 19: 17), until He was relieved, as described in v. 21, of the load under which He may have fallen in the weakness resulting from the strain of the agony in Gethsemane, the trials before the Jewish and Roman authorities, and the cruel scourging.
