

The 47 student workers hired this summer by the Region of Peel are being paid too much money, according to Mississauga Councillor Fred Hooper.

Hooper says there is no need to pay them more than \$3.25 an hour. The report from Stan Craig, Peel's personnel director, shows that the bottom rate was being earned by just two student workers, one at the Sheridan Villa seniors' home in Mississauga and the other a clerical worker at a

Thursday that showed student workers are be-

ing paid between \$3.72 and \$7.81 an hour.

Most of the 47 students are paid between \$4.75 and \$5.81 an hour with just one, a social worker with the region's social services department, being paid the high rate of \$7.81 an

University students employed in their first work term for the region receive 20 per cent less than union scale. During their second work term they receive 10 per cent less than union scale and during their third and fourth work terms are paid full union rates.
