New Yerk, April 25—A Valparaiso despatch to The Herald, dated Sunday, says: One deadeand fifty more er less severely wounded, as a result of a collision yesterday in Santiago between a police department and 'a crowd of workmen. The latter had just attended an epen air conference of a Catholic priest, Father Jose Julio, who is called the South American Savonarola, who, while advocating the simple life, dehounced "the perversity" of his former bishop and "the adulteration of Christ's doctrine."

When they were met by a religious procession after the conference, considered by the workmen as a grotesque spectacle, the men attempted to stop it, but the police charged a score of times with unsheathed's swords, the workmen answering with a rain of stones. The majority of the newspapers blame the police.

London, April 25.—The grave suspictions which have been gathering against Mrs. Covell as the perpetrator of the murder of Eliza Lowry, because of the discrepancies in her stories of the murder, came to a head yesterday. Detective Rogers confronted her with her errors, but after two hours' examination, falled to make any cose against the old weman. The search has ended at a stone wall, and unless new clues are found, the murderer will never be brought to book.

The flaws which have come up in Mrs. Covell's story are many and serious, but it cannot be proven that they are more than the mistakes of an intellect seriously deranged by the experiences of the night of the murder.
