THE premature death, at the age of twenty-one 1 of that promising poet, Henny Kirke White, has been sincerely regretted by every admirer of genius; and his brief life has afforded one of the finest examples on record of youthful talent and per-severance devoted to the purest and noblest objects.

He was born at Nottingham, in 178s. His father was a butcher by trade—an "ungenite craft"—and so little sympathy had he with his son's taskes and predilections, that he not only kept him from school one day a week to carry out meat, but for a time employed him entirely in this ungenial ask.
