Toronto, Monday, July 29—Money lenders tell us that if we are for cheaper money this fall we will be disappointed. The "Trade" Bulletin reports a time loan of \$100,000 at seven per cent in Montreal. The banks are discounting mercantile paper at the rate of seven per cent, and so it goes. A real estate man in Guelph recently gave the Farm and Dairy market man a little additional light on the scarcity of currency when he stated that from the city of Guelph he had secured \$1,000,000 in the last year for real estate investment in the West. For real estate the same is true all over the country.

POTATOES AND BEANS

There are too many old potatoes calling for a market. Ontario potatoes are quoted at 75c out of store, car lot, 60c; Delaware, 80c; Ontario, 85c; Michigan, \$3.50 a barrel. Canadian potatoes, all sizes, are quoted at 15c to 18c per bushel. Beans are quoted at locally at 37c to 40c for primes and 30c to 32c for hand picked. Montreal quotes three-pound pickers at \$1.66 to \$1.70.

HONEY

Owing to the dearth of fruit being offered, trade in honey is dull. Dealers predict a drop in prices at an early date. Ontario honey is quoted at 25c to 30c per lb. in 60 lb. tins; 25c in 10 lb. tins, 15c in 5 lb. tins; buckwheat, 9c in 10 lb. tins, and 8c in 5 lb. tins. Imported honey per doz. extra, 93 per doz. No. 2, 82 per doz.

EGGS AND POULTRY

Whether or not dealers are strictly living up to their word for a reduction on the loss of system, it is certain that they are drawing the lines on quality firmer than they ever did in this country. Must all result to the good of the trade. Wholesale dealers quote new laid eggs at 26c to 28c; fresh, 26c to 28c; second and split, 16c to 18c. Montreal dealers find the market for fresh reduced prices to 19c f.o.b. country points.

Dressed poultry quotations are: Fresh broilers, 14c to 16c; chickens, 14c to 16c; ducks, 14c to 16c; turkeys, 16c to 18c.

DAIRY PRODUCE

The butter trade is dragging. This is not because consumers are buying less, but because more is being made and there is no increased demand at present prices. The action of the market is in reducing butter half a cent is taken by many. LIVE STOCK

The past week has been a disastrous one for live stock buyers. Prices have steadily decreased to a point 2c below the level ruling at the end of the week. This depression of values is partly accounted for by the inferior quality of the stock delivered. Another explanation is however that receipts were liberal on every day of the week. Thursday of the past week which is the closing day, found little of the few drovers with cattle left on their hands. Choice spring calves found little of the \$6.70 to \$6.90; medium, \$6.25 to \$6.65. Final values for choice butchers' cattle were \$6.40 to \$6.70; common to good, \$4.60 to \$6.40; choice cows, \$5.25 to \$6.00; common to good, \$3 to \$5.25; butcher bulls, \$4 to \$5.50; calves, \$3 to \$4.50; steers, \$3.50 to \$5.50. Canners, \$1 to \$2; cubs, \$75 to \$85.

Milch cows are quoted at 855 to 875 for 13,000 lbs. of milk, medium to medium and springers, 855 to 875.

Mutton quotations are not quite so satisfactory. Last week's values have remained fairly firm. Lambs, 86c to 88c; spring, 86c to 88c; ewes, \$2.50 to \$3.50; culls, 82c to \$1.50.

MONTREAL HOG MARKET

Montreal, Saturday, July 26—There was not much change of note in the market for live hogs this week, and prices were firm for selected lots, weighed off cars, at \$10.35 to \$10.40 a cwt.

EXPORT CHEESE TRADE

Montreal, Saturday, July 26—Last week's decline in prices brought on an increased country from Great Britain, and the number of orders coming in at the low price was so great that buyers were inclined to go into the market this week and pay more money than they were wont to pay last week. There was more demand for colored cheese than several boxes a premium was paid for this size of cheese at 15c to 16c. The bulk of the cheese in the country were bought at this figure. Receipts continue to show a decline in quantity for this year, but not to such an extent as was noted at the beginning of the season.

EXPORT BUTTER STOCK

The market for butter is slowly but steadily declining in price. The last increased receipts as compared with last year, and the lack of speculative demand. FOR AYRSHIRE FANCIERS

A neat little booklet, "Canadian Records of Ayrshires," recently prepared by The Canadian Ayrshire Association, gives all of the records in a Record of Performance for an Ayrshire bull, and is a most interesting and attractive illustrated publication. It is a most valuable book, and should be in the hands of every Ayrshire man. From this booklet we take the following account of the record of the Ayrshire have done in Record of Performance to date.

Canadian cows gave a year's average of 10,651.9 lbs. milk and 411.6 lbs. fat in four years. The best cow in the world, 3216 lbs. butter fat, 83 lbs. fat, 5,974 lbs. butter fat.
