LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO

Yesterday's market was merely a clean-up for the week, less than 200 fresh cattle being on sale, and there were no price changes of note. The market continues to hold its ground and there is a good deal of optimism as to the future. Unless we have a very heavy run in Monday, which seems unlikely, we look for a good trade the early part of next week.

In the small stuff the calf market is stronger, veal selling up to \$13.50 and \$17.50, but they have to be brought to the market to bring these prices. Medium veal is selling from \$14 to \$15 common veal, \$10 to \$12.50; and grassers \$5 to \$6 a cwt.

In the sheep and lambs, with nominal receipts, choice grain-fed lambs are selling from \$13.50 to \$14, with some selling a shade more money. Choice grain-fed sheep are selling at \$8.50 to \$9.50.

We would warn drovers to be very careful on the poor, thin sheep, as they are meeting a bad market. Although lambs are coming in they are selling at very high prices, \$15 to \$19 apiece.

The United Farmers sold two baby beavers weighing 920 and 830 lbs. apiece at \$12 per cwt., the highest price for the day.
