Cyclone Carries Death and Destruction to ar

Guthrie, O. T., March 31. — Chaos reigns in the town of Chandler. Last night's terrible cyclone has turned the peaceful town of 1,500 inhabitants into a veritable morgue, and its principal business buildings and residences lie wrecked in all directions.

As yet there is no way of getting at the actual number of wounded and dead, so intense is the confusion. The death list is variously estimated at from 25 to 50, with the injured numbering from 75 to twice that number. Already 20 dead bodies have been recovered.


