EUROPEAN AFFAIRS. (FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.) LONDON, August 15, 1851. On the Thursday preceding the prorogation an incident occurred in the House of Commons which ought not to be omitted in my brief record of the acts of the Session. You will remember that Mr. Heywood, about a fortnight since, carried a motion authorizing the retention of the Crystal Palace until the 1st of May next. It seems however, that this course is contingent upon the previous sanction of the Commissioners, with whose powers Parliament has nothing whatever to do. Conscious of this, Mr. Heywood again put a question to Ministers, very indignantly reported, but the object of it was to elicit a distinct pledge from the Government, that the Palace should at least be preserved till the first of March.
