FOR THE MALTESE

Special Services in St. Basil's Church Held Last Night

Services are being conducted in St. Basil's Roman Catholic church in the Maltese tongue. Rev. Father Taboni, a fellow countryman and a priest of the Jesuit Order, is conducting the services which were held last evening and this morning. Services will be held this evening, and morning and evening services to-morrow. Father Taboni, who is stationed at Guelph, is the guest of Dean Brady. Father Taboni is the first Maltese priest to visit Brantford.

Women's Bank Only One in World Declares a Five Per Cent. Dividend.

BERLIN, Jan. 15.—The Berlin Women's Bank, which is believed to be the only bank in the world run for, and by women exclusively has just completed five years of existence, and is to celebrate the event on Jan. 17.

A luncheon will be given on that date with several hundred guests, and future plans for the development of the bank will be announced. Among the plans is the establishment of a daily newspaper for women.

The assets of the bank amount to \$250,000. It declared a five per cent. dividend in 1912. It is the only bank in Germany where women are permitted to have a cheque account without the permission of their husbands. The bank, although it is intended only for women, does not disdain to have dealings with the inferior sex.

It's Carelessness Frozen Pipes Numerous in City This Week—An Explanation

Within the last day or two hundreds of people have complained to secretary of the Waterworks department that the water was turned off. The water was not turned off, but the pipes in the buildings and residences from where the complaints came from, were frozen. In many instances it was the owners' fault that the pipes were frozen. Out of 42 complaints investigated yesterday it was found that in 38 instances the frozen pipes were due to windows being left open or broken lights. Because of the extreme cold, many pipes have been burst.

Exodus of Americans From Canada Grows Last Year More Than Fifty-two Thousand Recrossed Border.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—While the large immigration into Canada from the United States is well known, the heavy exodus the other way is not so much heard of. During the last six years the number coming across the line to settle in Canada was 618,112 but the number crossing from Canada to become permanent residents of the United States in the same period was 504,919. Thus Canada's net gain in the six years was only 21,193.

A very considerable portion of the exodus was made up of Americans who had settled here but were returning to their own country. The number 22,332 in 1910, but in 1913 the number had increased to 54,497.

STREET RAILWAY REFUSES TERMS OF JUDGE

Mr. Stockdale Evidently Does Not Like Idea of Independent Receiver

[By Special Wire to The Courier] TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 15.—The Grand Valley case in which the latest denouncement has been an application by the city of Brantford and the National Trust Co. for leave to appeal from the Receiver's order, did not come up to-day. When the matter came before Mr. Justice Middleton a week ago at Osgoode Hall it was thought that some sort of an understanding might be arrived at on the Receivership stage. So far, presumably, no settlement has been reached. Mr. Justice Middleton had said that another appointment might be made in which event the matter could be mentioned again.

"Matters have not been arranged so far," said George H. Watson, K.C., to The Courier to-day; "and it is thought that there will be further appearance before Mr. Justice Middleton." The date of the new appointment has not been set, but I shall write about it, probably to-day."

Before Mr. Justice Middleton, Mr. Watson suggested that the National Trust Company name some one to be appointed with E. B. Stockdale, manager of the Trust and Guarantee Co. This was not acted upon at the time.

The outcome of course is conjectural but indications point to further argument before Mr. Justice Middleton.

PRICE OF GAS MAY BE RAISED

Company's Expense in Purifying Supply May Cause Increase.

Whether the Brantford Gas Co. consequent upon the expenditure of purifying the present supply of gas, will increase the price to the consumer could not be ascertained to-day. A reporter inquired from the local manager, Mr. Fair, but that gentleman was unable to give the necessary information. Mr. E. Sweet was out of the city and could not be seen. It is said that the company can charge up to 85 cents per thousand for gas, and that would be a big jump from the present price. It is thought in some quarters that an increase will be made, although not to such a great extent. When the company and city recently fought the case of impure gas, the company officials asserted plainly that an increase in price would be effected if they had to go to the expense of putting in a purifying process.

Fine Hockey This Brutality

One Player Charged Another Necessitating Ten Stitches in Head

[By Special Wire to The Courier] MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—A fine of \$15 and a thirty minute penalty are all the punishments to be given "Bad Man" Joe Hall for his vicious assault on "Newsy" Lalonde at the Arena on Wednesday night. Hall charged Lalonde from behind, smashing the great French player headfirst into the V shaped fence behind the nets. Lalonde's head was torn open in two places, necessitating ten stitches and he will be out of the game for a week at least.

President Quinn declared this morning that he would abide by the referee's report on the matter and taken further steps to punish Hall.

Lalonde declared that the assault was absolutely intentional. "I have it on good authority," declared Lalonde, "that Hall offered to bet \$500 I would not finish the game."

Quebec club officials insisted that the injury to Lalonde was accidental. So does Hall himself.

CAUGHT AT OTTAWA

Man Who Held Up Montreal Herald Office for \$500.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—The man who held up the cashier of The Herald Company some weeks ago, and made a clean getaway with \$500, is thought to be in custody in Ottawa.

This morning Chief Carpenter received a photograph of a man calling himself Robert Barrett, being held by the Ottawa police which was instantly identified by the victim of the hold-up. The local police have asked the Ottawa authorities to hold the man until an officer from Montreal can reach the capital and bring him back here.

Travelling with him was a woman who called herself Rose Ann Barrett, who is believed to be a woman from Sherbrooke. She is also being held and will be brought back to Montreal.

CATTLE KILLED.

ELIZABETH, N. J. Jan. 15.—Between 100 and 150 head of cattle were killed to-day when a passenger train, westbound, ploughed into the rear of a cattle train, wrecking several cars. Traffic was delayed for more than an hour. The passenger train was undamaged.
