

DITTEN TIUTT Becker Will Die in the Electric Chair it is Felt.

By Special Wire to the Conrier. New York, July 29 .- Final prepara

tions for the execution at Sing Sing prison early to-morrow morning of Charles Becker, formerly a police lieutenant, for instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, were begun at the prison to-day, following the announce-ment of Justice Ford's decision denying Becker a third trial. The hour of the execution is set for 5.45 a.m. tomorrow. There was much speculation to-day

as to whether Becker's counsel would attempt to make any further appeal in his behalf which might act as a stay AMERICAN SAILORS of his execution, or whether any such appeal were possible. One of Becker's attorneys said that there would be a

meeting of the prisoner's counsel early to-day to consider Justice Ford's decision and decide whether they could do anything further to save Becker from the chair.

Justice Ford had declared that the case was now entirely in the hands of Governor Whitman, and that clemency, if any were granted, must come from him. Condemned Man Has Been LITTLE DEFINITE NEWS IN Prepared For His Prepared For His Doom.

Ossining, N.Y., July 29.—Charles Becker, former New York police lieu-tenant, condemned to die to-morrow for instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, gambler, is reported to be bearing up well to-day under the real-ization that virtually all hope of his escaping the electric chair has pass-

Less than an hour after Becker received word that Supreme Court Jus-tice Ford had denied his appeal for a third trial, the condemned man threw himself on his cot. Becker lay with his face to the wall and the guard said

his face to the wall and the guard sa'd he did not move all night. Becker arose at 7 o'clock to-day. Af-ter breakfast he was taken from his cell, given a bath and new suit of un-derwear. The top of his head was then closely cropped, to permit of perfect contact with the electrodes in the helmet attached to the death chair.

When Becker reurned to his cell he found that all of his clothing, personal belongings and even the few furn shings of the cell had been removed On a new cot lay a thin black suit, white shirt with soft collar and a black tie. Black stockings and soft felt slippers were also provided. Father Cashin, the prison chaplain and Becker's spiritaul adviser, is ex-pected to spend considerable time with the condemned man to-day and to-night. Father Cashin will also ac-company Becker to the death cham-
