Fall Excursions To Montreal

Sad Drowning and Brave Attempt at Rescue

On Saturday, Aug. 30th., a sad drowning accident occurred near South Blomidon, when Everett Corkum, aged 14 years, the only son of Mr. George Corkum, came to an untimely end. While bathing about 11 o'clock in the morning at Mill Creek, he got astride of a log and using his hands as paddles got out into deep water, the log however commenced to turn over, it being wet and slippery, he was unable to retain his hold and letting go attempted to regain the shore, only to sink. At this time Mr. Lloyd Legge, a son of Mr. Benjamin Legge, of Scotts Bay Road, who had been watching from a distance saw the boy sinking, and ran to help him and bravely plunged into the water, which was some 15 feet deep and though himself also unable to swim, attempted to rescue the boy, only to find himself in danger of drowning and but for the timely help of some boys who pushed out a plank to him would probably have lost his life. The body was recovered some hours later at low tide.

Much sympathy must go out to Mr. George Corkum in his loss, as he himself is sick and confined to his bed with rheumatism and his little son was his only helper. Some two years ago another young son also lost his life through being burnt to death in a barn. The brave action of Mr. Lloyd Legge deserves more than passing notice and though he was not successful he has the satisfaction of knowing that he did all that was in his power to save the boy.

The rain of the past week has been gladly welcomed by the farmers.

Train Wreck at Kentville

Tuesday night about ten o'clock, one of the largest special trains that ever passed over the D. A. Ry., came into Kentville. It contained 22 coaches filled with men of the 78th, regiment, Pictou, on the way to Aldershot for a fortnight's drill. This train was drawn by three engines.

The train came to a sad mishap before reaching its destination. At the points where the main line branches off toward the C.V. Branch north of the machine shops part of the train left the track. Three large I. C. R. coaches filled with soldiers slid down a steep embankment and another car was derailed. For some most fortunate and almost unaccountable reason not one of the inmates of the cars was hurt. The whole Regiment arrived at Aldershot not much the worse of the shaking up.

The cars remained coupled together and did not roll over. They were not very much damaged. The large Crane Car Stellarton and a crew from Truro, arrived on Wednesday. One car was lifted on Wednesday evening and the other two yesterday.

A large number visited the scene and witnessed the wreck and the process of lifting the cars to the track. The D. A. R. has always been most fortunate in all the wrecks which have occurred.
