KENTVILLE TOWN COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the Kentville Town Council was held Wednesday evening, March 1st, the Mayor, all the Councillors, Recorder and Deputy Clerk being present.

Schools—Chairman McBride reported expenditures of \$695.90 for month of February, making a total of \$1,327.56 for year.

Streets—Chairman Newcombe reported expenditures of \$54.62 for month, total of \$151.01 for year.

Water—Chairman Hiltz reported expenditures of \$56.45 for month, total of \$103.02 for year.

Police—Chairman Lamont reported one arrest and conviction on January 22nd for reckless driving.

A delegation from the Merchants Association addressed the Council asking to have the night watchman appointed another year and asked for a grant of \$200.00 to supplement their own personal subscriptions. No action was taken, the matter being laid on the table until next meeting when the estimates will be under discussion.

R. U. Parker's complaint re house sewer was presented. Plea was not granted.

A number of bills were passed and ordered paid.

The Mayor read a telegram from Major Phinney of the 85th Battalion, Halifax, in reference to a visit of the 85th Band, here (notice of which appears in another column) and the Council was asked to provide accommodation during their stay in Kentville. The whole Council was appointed a Committee to look after the matter.

On the recommendation of Councillor Newcombe it was decided to put one electric light in the cellar of Town Hall and one in the barn in connection as this would be very advantageous in case of fire.

Councillor McBride gave notice of a resolution which would be brought before the next meeting in re Poll Tax.

Councillor Caldwell gave notice of a resolution to be moved at next meeting regarding interest on overdue taxes.

Council adjourned.

GOD SPEED THE HIGHLANDERS.

Recruiting for the Highland Brigade under Colonel Allison H. Borden is going on with a swing which points to ultimate success. At Halifax enlisting is so great that each day's list runs up toward the hundred mark, and elsewhere in these columns will be found a list showing what has been done at Wolfville. The fire of enthusiasm has just been lighted and the first week of recruiting may nearly reach the one thousand mark.

Colonel Borden and his band of recruiters and musicians have visited Lunenburg and Mahone Bay and set the heather on fire in those places where many solid recruits have been obtained. President Cutten has joined Colonel Borden and they will continue the tour of the Western Counties coming back to Kentville March 11th.

Kentville has enlisted about twenty and with the return of Lieut. J. D. Spidell from Halifax to engage in the work of recruiting, it is expected that many more will be obtained here within the next week.

We wish God Speed to all the workers in forming the Highland Brigade.

Governors of Acadia Grant Leave of Absence to President Cutten.

At an emergency meeting of the Governors of Acadia University held in Wolfville last Thursday, President Cutten made his statement that he felt called to answer to the call of duty of the Empire and requested permission to allow him to go Overseas in command of a battalion to be raised for the 85th Highlanders. His statement of his duty awakened the deepest feeling in the hearts of his listeners. The Governors whilst expressing their deep feeling of regret in his departure from the Presidency of the College, further made plain statement of their high appreciation that they had at Acadia a man whom the Empire needed at this time and one they felt the University must make the sacrifice, to fill the important position to which he expected to be appointed. Leave of absence from the President's chair was granted Dr. Cutten covering the time necessary for his service abroad with the 85th Battalion. All wished the gallant and worthy President best of luck and a safe return to assume his college duties after the close of the war.

This heroic action of President Cutten has stirred the community here more than ever before since the war commenced. It is the hope of The Advertiser and all its readers that the noble band of men whom Dr. Cutten will lead will maintain the high standard which Canadians have raised for themselves in this war and that they will return safely to again assume their regular duties amongst their friends whom they will leave behind.

We trust that by Xmas of 1916, President Cutten will lead his gallant soldiers back to Nova Scotia, with the cruel war ended and our citizen soldiers ready to resume their former peaceful pursuits.

Mr. W. G. Coles, the well-known clerk at the Aberdeen, who recently enlisted and went to Halifax, informs us that he was misinformed as to his enlisting for Home Service. He says he intends going Overseas at the earliest opportunity. He has two brothers already who have donned the khaki, and he makes the third now on service for the Empire.
