**ATHENS INDEPENDENCE.**  
The Recorder of Friday last devotes nearly half a column to Athens commerce, in which it says that "when the B. & W. Railway was projected there were not wanting people who were ready to see the ruin of the village." Really, will the Recorder please tell us who those prophets were? There were possibly half a dozen men in this village who might be injured by the building of the railway, but these men all found other and, we believe, more lucrative situations, and could not now be induced to take up the same line of business. It remarks as to the boom are somewhat far fetched, as nearly all the buildings that it speaks about were either projected or under way before the railway was started. But the Recorder will not doubt wonder why our Brockville paper should manifest such an unusual interest in Athens and why it should deliberately misrepresent the opinions entertained by the few who were few—who were determined to denouncing the B. & W. The answer will be found in the following paragraph, clipped from the article above referred to:—"We have a newspaper had been started in the village and was liberally supported by the Athenians. This newspaper seems to be imbued with the idea that the interest of the village, and has been industriously pointing out that the railroad was ruining Athens to build-up a newspaper. We are citizens, and we get read occasionally outside its regular circle of readers and in this case it was not long till it was generally thought in Brockville and this section of the country that Athens was in a bad shape, that the bottom had fallen out of it, so to speak."  
Yes, in order to get a slap at the Recorder, this one-horse boiler plied fire created and attributed to our citizens opinions which they never entertained. This town has grown too large for its citizens to feel flattered at the reprehensible patronage of a representative of the Recorder, whose attempt to do its missionary work here the better for its all too limited finances. The chat about the railway and stage drivers affords the veriest nonsense. This village has now, as it has always had, a stage driver who would be only too glad to carry parcels from Brockville for our citizens, and the fact that there are but few parcels carried either by train or stage is what hurts the feelings of the Recorder man. The Brockville papers united in an effort to centralize the trade of the county, and we pointed out at the time, they failed in their attempt, most miserably, and we presume "we" of the Recorder came out to see how the Recorder was getting on. The Recorder of 23rd March was entitled "The Merchants of the village along the line (B. & W.) are selling goods at figures that will keep the merchants of the Brockville papers to the contrary." This truth was no doubt forced upon the "representative" during his visit here, and Friday's article was evidently an attempt to make the best of a very bad job. Regarding the Recorder's insulting and lying reference to this paper, we need say but little. It is no more than our experience with that paper leads us to expect. Just how pure a quality of lie the Recorder gave utterance to, the following paragraph from an article which appeared in the Recorder of Nov. 24th will serve to show:—"The rapid advance in wealth and commercial importance which Athens has made during the past few years is highly creditable to the industry and enterprise of our citizens. Building has been brisk and good houses have been erected. In fact within the past four years the village has progressed at a rate which would enable it in a few years to tower honors."  
In many ways Athens has been improved and the value of property increased, and from the spirit of our citizens as thus manifested we feel that all will unite in endeavoring to make the most of enlarged opportunities for public improvements which the incorporation of the village will afford.  
It is now policy for the Recorder to speak of its circulation. That is a sore spot which it should keep well covered; as the general public know full well that the decrease to 500 from the 1,000 circulation in Leeds which it enjoyed under Col. Wylie's management was caused by something more potent than water and was in a large measure due to the shiftlessness of the journalistic "barbarians" that hang around its office.

**ATHENS COUNCIL.**  
The village council met yesterday (Monday) for the transaction of business. All the members present. A large amount of business was done, which we summarize as follows:—  
J. Wills and Mr. Halladay were appointed a roads and bridge committee.  
M. Halladay, G. W. Greene and Thomas Bernay were appointed a committee of finance for the year.  
A by-law to impose a tax on dogs was passed through its several stages and finally passed. This by-law provides that all persons owning or harboring dogs shall pay an annual tax of \$1 on dogs and \$2 on bitches. For this year the by-law provides that a tag costing 10c. must be procured and be attached to each dog before the 1st day of April next. The penalty for non-compliance with the provisions of this by-law is that all animals found without a tag after the first of April will be destroyed. Mr. Halladay was appointed to procure the necessary tags for the clerk. A copy of the by-law for the inspection of all interested persons.  
A by-law respecting public morals and restraining tramps was passed by a majority of 5 to 4. A copy of the by-law was sent to the Chief Constable, Sanitary Inspector, Fence-viewers and Village Engineer was introduced. The blanks were filled as follows:—Chief Constable, H. C. Phillips; Sanitary Inspector, H. C. Phillips, salary \$20; Fence-viewers, Harvey Cameron and John Carr; Pound-keeper, H. C. Phillips.  
Henry Hawkins was granted \$2 for the support of Mrs. Denney, an indigent, on order granting \$1 per week to this person during the pleasure of the council was passed, and M. Halladay was appointed a committee to see Norman Hawkins and try and arrange for keeping Mrs. Denney.  
Council adjourned to meet on Monday next, 10th inst. at 2 p.m.
