## News Budgets by the Reporter's able staff of Correspondents

### LIBRARY BOOKS

All persons having volumes belonging to the old Mechanics' Institute library are requested by the Board of Management of the new public library to leave the same at the Reporter Office during this week. About 170 volumes are missing, and while the roll and record shows the whereabouts of many of them, the board takes this short way of recovering them instead of through the post. Many volumes were no doubt in the possession of students at the time the library closed, and these have probably been left in the homes where they boarded; so, though a resident may not have been a member of the Mechanics' Institute, he may in this way have possession of one or more of the books. Let every household make a careful search of his bookshelves and promptly send in any library volumes he may find. It is hoped that this appeal will meet a speedy response, as the new catalogue must be issued in a few days and it is desirable to have it as complete as possible. All books returned will be checked off the list now in the editor's hands.

### DANIEL'S BAND

A new religious denomination known as "Daniel's Band" has been established in Carleton County. One of the principal movers in the new faith is said to be Henry Pratt of Manotick, who according to report was formerly connected with the Holiness Movement church. It will be seen that at this meeting all the preparatory work of the board was placed in good form, and it is probable that the library and reading room will be opened to the public much sooner than was generally expected.


