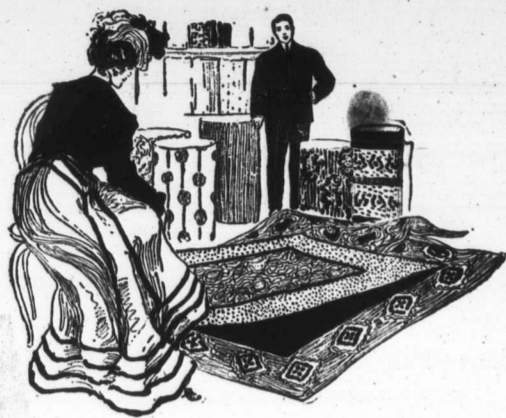

COOLING MILK

While the fad for milk aeration, with all its complicated and costly apparatus has passed, the need for cooling milk before sending it to the factory remains. In speaking on this subject recently, Mr. Publow said:—
I think this is one of the most important questions. About fifty per cent of the cans delivered at the cheese factories in Eastern Ontario stand in the barnyard and milking parlors, or in close proximity to these places. The main defect in milk delivered at the factories in Eastern Ontario is that it is overripe and not clean-flavored. Fully fifty per cent of the farmers who send milk to the factories simply pour the milk into the can and set it in its place. Some of them stir the milk, but fifty per cent of them do no cooling whatever. If we can do anything towards the adoption of a good and uniform system of caring for milk, it would be well worth doing. But the method must be simple. The instructors with us are advocating the building of a separate stand for the milk, and combing with it an ice-house. Have the stand built with a roof and have in a clean place. Cool the milk immediately after milking, and while it is cooling stir it. We advocate, for use in stirring, a dipper with a solid handle, something that can be kept clean. After the milk has been cooled to sixty-five degrees, put the cover on and leave it. If we can have the milk cooled kept in a clean place, we can do more to raise the standard and quality of cheese in Eastern Ontario than we could by sending out a hundred men next year to instruct the makers. The raw material is the first thing, and the important part is to have that right. The plan we propose must be simple and easily carried out. I believe that, under ordinary conditions, the milk should be cooled with a minimum exposure of air. I think that simply stirring the milk is all the aeration that it needs. But it must be cooled in order to make good cheese.

Brockville Police Troubles

The friction between the Police Committee and Chief Adams has culminated in a peculiar situation. Though he was dismissed by a letter prepared by the Town Solicitor, J. Hutcheson, K.C., the chief appears in uniform as usual, refusing to recognize his dismissal. The new Chief Burke is on duty, as is Sergeant Burns, Mr. Adams refuses to give up the keys of his office, but the men on the force have been told to take their orders from Mr. Burke, and the post-office has been ordered to deliver no mail for the police force to Mr. Adams.

The Chairman of the Police Committee is undecided whether to take forcible possession of the chief's office, or to await a special meeting of the Council. Every step taken has been under the advice of the Town Solicitor.

Two out of the three Police Commissioners favor Chief Adams' dismissal, but a majority of the ministers of the town and a large number of the business men have joined in requesting the council to retain his services.

VILLAGE COUNCIL

The village council met in special session on Thursday evening last. All the members of council present.

The recve submitted a tender from John Mulvena for supplying 4,000 bushels of sand at 5 cents per bushel, also one from Edward Taylor for 50 cords of stone at \$4.00 per cord, delivered as wanted.

The treasurer's bond for \$2,000 was placed before council for acceptance, and on motion an order was drawn on Treasurer for \$6.67 in favor of T. R. Beale for the guarantee company for treasurer's bond.

A motion appointing I. C. Alquire as a special auditor of the late treasurer of the public school board books was made on request of the public school board.

Walter C. Smith was appointed to the position of high school trustee in place of H. R. Knowlton, resigned.

A petition was presented by 19 ratepayers asking the council to make some much needed repairs to the main sewer on south side of Main street, and on motion Messrs. Jacob and Smith were appointed to investigate the condition of said drain and report at the next meeting.

On motion, tender of Edward Taylor to furnish 50 cords of building stone on town hall site was accepted, he to begin drawing not later than first week in June and stone to be furnished as rapidly as required.

On motion, the tender of John Mulvena to furnish 4,000 bushels of good, clean, sharp sand at 5 cents per bushel on town hall site was accepted, he to commence delivering not later than 15th June and deliver as fast as required by the builders.

The council then adjourned to meet at 7.30 p.m. on the first Monday of June as a court of revision of the assessment roll, and for the disposal of any other business found necessary.

Andrew Henderson was appointed overseer of road div. 16 in place of Fred Scovil, who did not want to act.

Orders were given on the Treasurer as follows: B. Loverin, for 12 feet 8in tile for culvert in road near Geo. Bradley's, \$3.00; grant to St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, Brockville, \$5.00; A. W. Kelly, salary as assessor, \$25.00, equalizing five union school section assessments, \$12.50, repairing bridge and culvert in div. 7, \$9.45, for unloading crusher and moving it to road div. 12, \$7.50; W. Karley, rope, etc., for crusher, \$8.45; H. R. Knowlton, minute book, 75c; Geo. Jackson, putting rings and hooks on chains for crusher, \$1.75; Queen City Oil Co., oil and cans, \$7.85; B. D. Steacy, supplies for crusher, \$24.06; M. Milroy, mending bale on elevator, 75c; Geo. Cheetham, 90 feet elm plank, \$1.85.

Council adjourned until Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock to make arrangements for ruing crusher.

Bank Wins Case

The case of the Union Bank vs. Sheridan to recover \$1,075 found by John Sheridan, a Brockville carter, last July was heard in Brockville this week. The money was supposed to be a portion of a \$5,000 package stolen from the mails in transfer from the Union Bank at Montreal to its Smith's Falls branch. The money disappeared and two months later, Sheridan, while moving coal oil barrels, from the river front, Brockville, found the package secreted among them. They were all Union Bank bills, and though the bank could not produce direct evidence to show the bills were a portion of the registered package, the judge thought a good case had been made out along circumstantial lines, and in favor of the bank and so gave his decision, reserving decision on costs.
