IS MARS PROPLED ?

Such a Claim Advanced by a German & cientist.

He Gives Many Reasons for his Belief in This Matter.

"Is Mars inhabited?" has been asked very often during recent years and has engaged the serious atten-tion of many astronomers and espe-cially of M. Camille Flammarion, a noted French scientist and author. Some new light is now thrown on

this subject by Professor Ernst Haeckel, an eminent German philo-sopher, in a book entitled "World Problems. After pointing out that men have been studying the heavens for more than 4,500 years and have only been studying themselves for the last half century he says we may safely assume that the many fixed stars whose light requires thousands of years to reach us are suns and are surrounded by planets and worlds similar to those we know. We may also assume, he holds, that thousands of these planets have arrived at the same stage of development as our world, and it naturally follows that on them the same conditions of life prevail as on this earth, and there is no valid reason why human beings should not live there as they

do here.
Professor Haeckel takes care to explain that there are doubtless many planets the temperature of which is such that life, as we understand the term, cannot be sustained on them. He thinks it very probable that there are types of unimals and plants on some planets which are not to be found on the earth. According to him it is very likely that the biogenetic process exists on Mars, Venus and possibly some other planets of our system, as well as on planets of other solar systems, but plants on these planets have reached a higher stage of development than has been reached by animals and plants of

If we assume that Mars is inhabted-and Professor Hackel pretty well satisfied that it is-we nust assume, he holds, that the men and women whose home is on the planet are not such as we, but of a far higher type. They may resemble us exteriorly, but they are free from our physical defects and excel us in strength and gracefulness. It is in the intellectual sphere, however, that their superiority is most clearly shown. If there are human beings on these planets, says Prof. Haeckel, it is extremely probable that they far surpass ordinary men and women n intelligence.

MILLIONS FOR FARMERS IN THE SALE OF MILK.

The annual report of the bureau of industries of the Province of Ontario for 1898 gives the number of creamer-ies in operation as 282, an increase of ies in operation as 282, an increase of 68 over the previous year. These 282 made 9,008,992 pounds of butter, for which the patrons received \$1,294,220. The report of 1,187 cheese factories shows that they made 128,111,924 lbs. of cheese, for which the patrons received \$8,417,535. While the farmers of Ontario received nearly \$10,000,000 of milk money in one year, the Kent county farmers have only received county farmers have only received \$21,424. The Elgin county farmers, on the other hand received \$219,760

The Maple City Creamery commenced operation a little over a year ago, ed operation a little over a year ago, and has made a steady run ever since with the exception of six weeks last spring, on account of the bad roads. It has paid to the patrons \$6,422.92 and returned eighty pounds of skim milk for every hundred pounds of new milk sent in. The greater part of the summer's make of butter was put up expressly for the export trade, for expressly for the export trade, for

which there is an unlimited demand. The highest average wholesale price for any one month was 231-2 cents in September and the lowest 161-4c in May, when dairy butter was selling from 10 to 11c. The difference in price alone would pay all expense of hauling the milk, making and selling butter and give to the patrons fully as much ready money as they fully as much ready money as they could make if they would do all the work themselves, and if the milk sent to the creamery had been made into dairy butter, ten cents would have been the highest price all summer. If the time and laborrof caring for the milk and making the butter was put into milking, the number of cows kept could be doubled. The following comparative state-

The following comparative statement is exclusive of skim milk or whey and the cost of maufacture:

The Maple City Creamery average for hundred pounds of milk, 67.5 cents.

The 282 creameries average 60.6. The 1187 ch eese factories average 61.2.

The Elgin county cheese factory,

It will be noticed that (The Maple City Creamery has paid the highest average price per hundred pounds of milk. This is accounted for by the proprietor having full charge of all sales, and by watching the markets closely. He has often made sales at a cent a pound more than the market price, and not being a stock company, no president, secretary or treasurer to pay, so that the cost of making is half a cent per pound less than the majority of creameries are charging. It will be noticed that the total cheese factory average is a trifle more than the creameries average, but as the whey has a feeding value of only five cents a hundred pounds, skim milk is valued at twenty-five cents per hundred pounds. This will give to the creamery patrons twenty cents per hundred pounds more for their milk than would be paid to the cheese factory patrons.

KEEP WATER OFF THE ROADS If Work Is Well Done Even Clay Make

Water is the greatest enemy to road making and if it can be ex-cluded or got rid of, most materials, even clay, will make a goo road. Gravel, or clay and gravel combined, make an excellent road when free from water, but when mixed with rain it is a failure. the rainy season in autumn, if the road bed is flat, or if there are ruts or depressions holding the water, or if there are pools of water in the ditches, or by the roadside, it permeates the ground till the road-bed to a considerable depth is perfectly saturated or filled with water, making a soft, muddy road till freezing time, when there is a rough, frozen surface for a time. But the greatest trouble is in the spring time when we say the 'frost is coming out of the ground.' This water, when frozen is expanded in every direction, separating every atom of dirt or sand from every other atom, and when the ice melted, there remains this loose condition of the ground or road mater ial, with only water between and separating the particles of giving conditions that make the road unfit for use; and so we see it is the water that makes the mischief, and of whatever material the road is built the water must be excluded or the work is a failure; hence good drainage should be the first consideration. And so this section of road that has been selected for improvement should be well studied, and when it is determined what to do in view of permanence and durability why not proceed as is done in other work of like importance, and em-ploy experts in their line of work, or let the job by contract?

Device for Dressing Fowls.

The illustration shows what the New York Tribune calls one of the cleanest and most effective ways to pick the feathers from a fowl and keep them clean in the operation. A barrel has a hole made in one side, as shown, and below it is tacked a leather lip or spout. The dotted line

hows the position inside of two supports, between which the fowl is laid while being picked. The head projects from the opening, and all blood drains into the pail inside the barrel. As the feathers are plucked they fall into the bottom of the barrel, and are thus entirely unstained The picker sits on a box or stool at is desired within the barrel, saw of the .top down nearly to the middle thus giving a larger opening. Hen's feathers do not bring a large sum, but they should always be saved, either for home use or for the sun which they will bring, which really clear gain.

Renting Farms.

If a man wants to let his farm, save H. Winkleman in The Gazette, the conditions should be such as to induce the lesses to take proper care of it. This can only be done by giving a lease long enough to allow the tenant an opportunity to reap the benefits of his labor and of the invested capital. To accomplish this the tenant should lease the farm for two entire crop rota ions. If the land has been divided into six fields, the term of the lease should be 12 years, and if it is divi-ded into seven fields it should be 14 years, and so on, for a full crop ro tation is necessary to get the in good order, and another rotation is required to derive any profits from the labor and capital invested At any rate, such a long lease will make the lessee feel more at home and take an interest in the farm. He can introduce a good crop rotation make use of the advantages of green manuring, lime and fertilizers, breed good cattle, sheep or swine, grow sugar beets and undertake a good many improvements which will pay in a few years and will contribute to the advancement of farming and the prosperity of the country.

The poultry keeper who whitewash es his hen house four times a year need have no fear of it becoming infested with insect vermin, nor will it be necessary for him to fumigate it, as there will be no object in doing so since there will be no insect life to destroy. But the owner of a poultry house that ne ds fumigation should set about it in the following way : Remove all nests, perches and everything that is portable. pound of sulphur in a pan with some burning coals in the middle of the house. Then close up the doors, windows, and all other openings, and let them remain so for two or three hours. Afterwards paint the roosts tar, and whitewash the house both inside and out with lime. A spraying sump is very useful to get the lime wash into the crevices in the roosts and walls, and it is beneficial to add some carbolic acid to the limewash. Once a house is thoroughly from vermin it is easy to keep it so by attending to it regularly, and taking the precautionary measure of frequent limewashing.

Manure should be kept packed away from the air as tightly as possible, and if well rotted, should be plowed under just before planting; other-wise turn it under several months before that time. Contrary to the common opinion, half-rotted manure is more valuable than well rotted, because the former contains a large
