lid and Unique Military Career of the New Commander of the Governor General's Bodyguard.

Among the recent changes announced in The Militia Gazette is that of the Governor-General's Body Guard, the Governor-General's Body Guard, the command of which passes from Lieut.-Colonel Clarence A. Denison to Major Wm. Hamilton Merritt. Though there is a break in a family command, for the first time, yet the military traditions of the country should be fully maintained by the present commanding officer, whose family took a leading part in the French war, the revolutionary war and the war of 1812, 13 and 14. The Historical Record of the regiment sets forth these facts and the editor, Capt. E. J. Chambers, now of Ottawa, gives the following as a record: Major Merritt entered the G. G.B.G. as a trooper on the 28th of tawa, gives the following as a record: Major Merritt entered the G. G.B.G. as a trooper on the 28th of October, 1882, Second Lieutenant Feb. 29, 1884; Lieutenant 6th of June, 1884; Captain, May 31st, 1889; Major, second in command, June 11th, 1898; was appointed Adjutant August 2nd, 1889, and acted as such for some nine years, including service as acting Adjutant in Northwest campaign, 1885. He was in command of the party which captured the Sioux Chief, White Cap, and his band. When the South African war broke out he went at his riean war broke out he went at his own expense to Cape Town and of-fered his services and was appointed fered his services and was appointed a squadron commander in 1st Brabant's Horse, he also was at different periods of his service second in command et 2nd Brabant's Horse and A.D.C. to Gen. Sir E. Y. Brabant, K.C.B., C.M.G., and Colonel Daigety, C.B., his successor in command of the colonial division.

While connected with the colonial division. Major Major Marritt took part in

division, Major Merritt took part in the following general engagements: Labuscagnes Nek, Aliwal North, Wepener, Wittebergen, Lieliefontein, Veredefort, Schoolplatz, Magato's Nek, Doornhoek, Kwaggafontein and Cyferfontein. In an official record of services, issued er the breaking-up of the colonial division, Bricadier-General Sir E. Y. Brabent. that Major Merritt's conduc. "gave entire satisition" to his commanding officers, and, further, that he performed his duties "with zeal and ability.

on the colonial division being broken up Major Merritt returned to Europe and Captain Chambers goes on to state "December 29th, 1900, Major Merritt applied to the War Office for permission to raise in Candada a correst of light bases 600. Office for permission to raise in Canada a corps of light horse, 600 strong. His Majesty's Government were willing and anxious to have "the Canadian Rangers," raised by Major Merritt at the earliest possible moment after February &5, 1901. On the date in question the Under Secretary of State for War wrote the Under Secretary of State for the Colonies requesting him "to for the Colonies requesting him "to inform Mr. Secretary Chamberlain, that, if he concurs and if the Cana-dian Government agree, Mr. Brodrick is prepared to accept this (Major Merritt's) offer." The conditions of organization provided that the selection of officers and men should be in the hands of Major Merritt.

Feb. 20, 1901, the Colonial office wrote Major Merritt, transmitting a copy of the War Office letter and adding: "A copy of this letter has been forwarded to the Governor-General of Canada with an intimation that if his Ministers see no objection and are willing to assist in the man-ner indicated, His Majesty's Government will be glad to avail them-selves of your offer."

It is doubtful if there is another

It is doubtful if there is another case where the British Government authorized a Canadian officer to raise a corps in Canada entirely at the Imperial expense, and further giving that officer the right to choose his own officers and men. The final outcome of the matter was the despatch of the Second C. M. R. to South Africa in January, 1902, under the conditions originally agreed der the conditions originally agreed upon by the War Office, except that the Government of Canada selected
