following communication has been sent
in:Preparing for his holiday trip Dr.
Payzant contracted a cold the Saturday
before the Monday morning he left home.
Arriving in Montreal he was unable to
leave the hotel until long rested, and it
was noticed that he was not in health
good enough to enjoy the entertainment
freely accorded him by his family. He
was interested in. On the return trip,
unwell and wishing to meet his father,
he stepped off at St. Hubert, New
