THE GUN PICNIC A BIG SUCCESS

When it was proposed to hold
a big picnic in Hartland for the
purpose of raising money to pur-
chase a machine gun the most
optimistic never dreamed of the
success which resulted from the
event of last Thursday. The sev-
eral committee, however, went to
to work with a will and the result
of their labors has been one of the
biggest days Hartland has had
for many years, as well as the
gathering in of sufficient shekels
to buy the gun, with a good mar-
gin over to be applied to some
other form of the patriotic move-
ment.

There were over 1500 paid ad-
missions to the grounds and the
various schemes for separating
a man from his money did a
thriving business. The big swing
with its horse power never stop-
ped from early morning till late
at night. The bowling alleys,
shooting gallery, dolls, cane rack,
lifting and punching machines,
all had their devotees and helped
to swell the stream of coin which
now reposes in the bank waiting
its final disposal.

But the "piece de resistance"
was the long line of tables pre-
sided over by the women of Hart-
land and the outlying parishes.
Here was served up food fit for
the gods, and from this source
alone was gathered in the sum of
\$578.81.

The Women's Institute had a
booth from which was auctioned
all manner of things, both useful
and ornamental. Adjoining was
a flower stand presided over by
young ladies whose duty it was
to see that all were provided with
bouquets—for a price.

The band was present in the
afternoon and evening and rend-
ered some choice music.

In the evening there was a
very creditable display of fire-
works which were much enjoyed.
Everybody was happy—even a
couple of heavy showers failed to
dampen the ardor of those intent
on having a good time, and by the
same token helping a good cause.

The lottery of two handsome
cakes, which was in charge of
Mrs. H. B. Boyer, brought in
\$17.50. By an error one of the
cakes had been sold at the auc-
tion and had to be repurchased at
an advance on the auction price
in order that there would be no
appearance of a shady transac-
tion.

In the afternoon F. B. Carvell,
M. P., and Donald Munroe, M.
L. A., gave brief patriotic address-
es and in the evening Lt. Brooks

vice roll for overseas duty. They

Humphrey Bubar, Upper Bright-
on; Lee Dyer, Carlisle. These
will join the regiment at Valcar-
tier. Later in the evening some
three or four others enlisted for
home service.

The baseball match between
Hartland and Florenceville was
hotly contested despite the down-
pour of rain. Hartland was the
winner, the score standing 5 to
3.

The tugs of war were very ex-
citing, but on account of the con-
dition of the ground after the
rain the finals were not pulled
off.
