## A New Road Law

Nearly ten thousand miles of travel over the roads of New Brunswick convinced Hon. Mr. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, that a new road act is necessary and suggested ideas for better construction, repair and maintenance. As a consequence he now is asking legislative consent to a road act that in many features is a radical departure from past acts. The demands for better roads, always heard, has become louder and more insistent with each succeeding year since the advent of the automobile. To meet this demand in a fair and reasonable way the new bill proposes to make an important distinction between trunk roads and branch roads, and provides for a patrol system of the former which, if efficiently maintained, should be most effective in keeping these roads in good repair. Of course an improved road system means heavier road taxes, and as the work is primarily and directly for the autoist it is premised the Legislature will see to it that the burden falls heaviest on those who use the roads most frequently and do the greatest damage. While the bill makes no definite announcement of an intention to change the rule of the road, it contains provision for a change that the Minister intimates will be made if the Province of Nova Scotia agrees. Under the now-existing conditions the change has become a necessity in the public welfare and will, it is hoped, be made at once. However the road act of Hon. Mr. Veniot works out in practice, there is all over the province a desire for road improvement. He will find the people sympathetic towards all efforts that promise actual betterment, and if that is the outcome of his activity his government will undoubtedly receive the credit and the benefit.

## Votes for Women

If the late Hon. H. R. Emerson was alive today, he would certainly be pleased at the action of the Legislature in unanimously affirming the principle of extending the franchise to women. Woman suffrage was Mr. Emerson's great hobby during the years that he was a member of the Legislature, but he was never able to induce more than one-third of the members to go on record in favor of the principle. Yesterday the members of the House, without a dissenting voice declared that the time had arrived when the franchise should be extended to women.—Mail.

## Early Hatching Needed

It is imperative that all chickens be hatched early this year because under present conditions of high feed prices chickens hatched late can hardly be reared profitably. The eggs for hatching should be selected with care. They should each weigh about two ounces, have a smooth surface and be oval in shape. The fresher the eggs the better they are for incubation but they may be held for seven days, during which time they should be kept in a temperature of fifty to sixty degrees and they should be turned occasionally.

## Income Tax Forms

Are now available

Returns must be filed on or before 31st March

**T**HE Dominion Income War Tax Act requires you to fill in one or more of the five special Forms provided before 31st March, 1918. In order to assist the public to understand just what is required of them, information on each Form is given below. Read carefully, then get three copies of the form that fits your case and fill them in. Answer all questions fully and accurately. For making false statements, a penalty of \$10,000 or six months' imprisonment, or both, is provided.

**Individuals.**—All persons unmarried, and all widows or widowers without dependent children, whose income is \$1500 a year or more, must fill in Form T1. All other persons whose income is \$3000 or more, use the same Form. Where any income is derived from dividends, list amounts received from Canadian and Foreign securities separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4. Partnerships, as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

**Corporations and Joint Stock Companies.**—No matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax on income exceeding \$3000. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

**Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees** use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

**Employers** must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

**Corporation Lists of Shareholders.**—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Shareholders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Figures in every case are to cover 1917 income—all Forms must be filed by 31st March. For neglect, a fine of \$100 for each day of default may be imposed.

In the case of Forms T1 and T4, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.
