### LOWER BLISSFIELD.

A cold wave passed over this community on Saturday and Sunday last, the mercury fell to fifteen below the cipher. Mr. Timothy Bowes met with quite an exciting occurrence on Thursday evening last. While on his way home from Mr. T. A. Hurley's camp, two large moose stepped out on the road, just in

front of Mr. Bowes's horse and much to his surprise the animals stood and faced the team and Mr. Bowes was compelled to take a stake from his sled and drive the creatures away. It was quite a courageous thing for Mr. Bowes to undertake to attempt to drive these furions creatures from his path with nothing more than a sled stake to defend himself.

### GREAT GAME YEAR.

Between 150 and 200 Moose and Many Bear and Caribou Killed.

The last season has been the record so far in New Brunswick for big game. There were more non-resident hunters in the woods, more animals shot, and they were of greater size says the St. John Daily Star. It is estimated that between one hundred and fifty and two hundred moose were killed and a large number of bear and caribou. About two hundred sportsmen from abroad were in after big game and very few of these returned without their trophy. Maine's record cannot for an instant compare with this. Thousands of sportsmen went into the Maine forests, but there were no more moose shot (if as many) than in New Brunswick.

To illustrate, about eighty non-resident sportsmen went into the Tobique country and a correspondent of the Star learns that up to the first of October thirty-five moose came out from there and after that date about fifteen more. These were all fine animals and the hunters were all pleased with their sport. The guides say that thirteen bear also came out from there and a number of caribou. Bear take the next place to moose in the hunter's eye.

The big game region of the province extends from a line drawn across the province from Fredericton to Moncton northward through the whole centre and northern part of the province. The favorite haunts of the moose, caribou and bear are in the region of the back bone of the province where are the headwaters of the various rivers Miramichi, Tobique, Nepisiquit, etc. Here in the forests and barrens they range in great numbers and usually the hunter does not have to go far from his camp before he sees them.

The most southerly of these game regions is that of the Canaan River, which is reached in five hours from St. John; then comes the Cains River region, then the Sou west and Nor-west Miramichi, then the Tobique, the Nepisiquit and Restigouche regions. The nearest route for American sportsmen is via the Tobique, and more went in this way last fall than by any other route. Next in favor is Boiestown, which is the base for reaching the Cains River and Sou west Miramichi regions. Sportsmen go in to Boiestown either from Fredericton or Newcastle, and a great many went in last fall, between sixty and seventy all told.

Others go in also from Coles Island and Chipman, in Queens County, from Campbellton, whence the Restigouche and Upsalquitch regions are reached, from Bathurst, the gateway to the Nepisiquit, from Woodstock and from Edmundston, whence the Green River and Temiscouche regions are reached.
