The forty-first annual matches of the Thirteenth Regiment were completed on Saturday last and the statistical officers have been busy making up the records. The year's work by this regiment is one that the city and the officers of the regiment, as well as every man connected with the regiment, has good reason to be proud of.

As will be seen the shooting was exceptionally high, and a record for the home ranges. The regimental team at the Ontario rifle Association matches won the "last cup" with an average of 90 points per man, being the highest score ever made in the history of the Company.

The men met on the street here shortly before 1 o'clock this morning, and after a short exchange of words, it is alleged, Chevalier struck Baby with a smashing blow across the face. Baby fell to the ground, his head striking the corner of a stone step as he fell, causing the injury from which he died twelve hours later.
