



MINE ENTRANCES SEALED.

An Attempt to Smother Flames at Hanna, Wyo.

Hanna, Wyo. Hanna, Wyo., March 30.—Up to to-night none of the 62 victims of Satur-day's two explosions in mine No. 1 of the Union Pacific Coal Co, had been re-covered, except the five corpess blown from the shaft by the explosions of dust and gas. The condition of these bodies precludes the possibility that any of the men in the mine survived the second explosion. The official list of the known victims of the disaster given out to-day by the Union Pacific Coal Co. contains 62 names. It is believed by some that probably ten others also met death in the mine.
