

TOLEDO FIRE. Toledo, O., Jan. 20.—A fire last night caused damage amounting to \$250,000. The heaviest losses were those of the Brown, Eager & Hull Book Co., Fleischmann's cafe, Scotch woolen mills, Knaf's jewelry store and the Hudson Dry Goods Co. There were two performances in theatres, and the audiences were hastily dismissed.

LICENSES IN W. FLAMBORO. Possibility of Council Making a Further Reduction. (Special Despatch to the Times.) Dundas, Jan. 20.—There is a possibility of lively times again this year in West Flamboro Township over license affairs. It will be remembered that about this time last year the council of that township passed a by-law requiring the License Commissioners to cut off two of the four licenses then in force. The efforts of the commissioners and the authorities in Toronto to frustrate the will of the people being finally over-ruled, the licenses at Bullock's Corners and at Freetown and Hayland resumed. Now it is reported, one of the license holders is out of favor with the commissioners. This unexpected turn of affairs has, so the Bullock's Corners hostility, to see the possibility of again securing a license for his place. To be prepared for this he is circulating a petition to have a license granted him. It is reported that he is meeting with encouraging success in getting signatures, and has hopes of having his license restored and the other fellow losing his. There is, however, in the way of this consummation the possibility that the council may order another reduction in the number of licenses issued, which could be carried into effect by cutting off the offending license holder, and leaving the Bullock's Corners house without the coveted permission to dispense booze.

FATHER KILLS A MAN TO AVENGE IT, AND THEN PUBLISHES HER SHAME. Columbus, Miss., Jan. 19.—Charles Smith, the millionaire planter who killed Eugene Laurent at Artesia last Friday and who was released on a \$80,000 bond, was rearrested this afternoon on a warrant for murder, sworn out by Laurent's brother.

SHOT ACCUSED. Another Chance to Plead the Popular Unwritten Law. Hattiesburg, Miss., Jan. 19.—Albert Fairley, who was this morning acquitted of a charge of criminally assaulting Mattie Brakeford, was this afternoon fatally wounded by George Brakeford, father of the girl.

BRITISH COLONIAL POLICY. Earl of Crewe Emphasizes Need for Continuity. London, Jan. 19.—A distinguished gathering welcomed Lord Northcote at the Royal Colonial banquet tonight. The Earl of Crewe presided. Lord Northcote remarked on the necessity of viewing the yellow immigration question from the Australian viewpoint. He declared that Australia was increasingly protectionist and urged the necessity of British emigration. The Earl of Crewe emphasized the desirability of continuity in the colonial policy, and said he would give the question of interchange of officers in the garrisons serious consideration.

Great Lakes Vessel Men Meet to Consider Question.

NINE SKELETONS FOUND.

Thought to be Remains of Indians—Excavating in Sandwich.

Windsor, Jan. 19.—While excavating near Taylor's Point, in Sandwich, this morning, workmen came across the remains of nine skeletons in a fairly good state of preservation. The remains are thought to be those of Indians buried there a century ago. Two stone pipes and a stone drinking jug were also found.

ORDER OF ELIZABETH.

Great Cross Bestowed on Queen Helena of Italy.

Rome, Jan. 19.—Count Lutzw, the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador, was received in private audience by her majesty to-day. He came to deliver from Emperor Francis Joseph the great cross of the Order of Elizabeth in recognition of the Queen's trip to the earthquake territory and her labors for the stricken people. The order was instituted in 1898, and is limited to women who accomplish great deeds.

Eight Prisoners Escape.

Wheeling, W. Va., Jan. 19.—Eight prisoners escaped early to-day from jail at Weston, W. Va., Moundsville, W. Va., and Charleston, W. Va. The wife of the Weston jailer is in a serious condition from being choked and beaten by four men who escaped there. Of the two men who left the Charleston jail, one was later recaptured. Bloodhounds are trailing the other seven men. The majority of them are desperate characters.

The Toronto Board of Control has declined an offer from the Toronto Electric Light Company, made with a view to obviating a municipal plant.
