But the law in question is only mall part of what was done. On January 20, 1920, there will descend upon the country the full force of the 18th Amendment to the Constitition duly adopted and ratified during the war time by two-thirds of the Federal Congress and by three-quarters of the State Legislatures. This prohibits all sale, manufacture, import and export.

The amendment is supreme. Under the American system of Government no power in the land can set it aside, save only a repeal by a smilar amend
