LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Invitations have been issued by His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McKinnon, for a ball at Government House on Wednesday evening 25th inst.

A Paris despatch of this date says: The Riviera has been visited by a snowstorm, and the unusual severity of the weather is causing great discomfort and damage.

A heavy shock of earthquake was felt early yesterday morning in the city of Mexico. At Jalapa the capital of the state of Vera Cruz one section of the infantry barracks collapsed.

Mr. Martin of Queens has given notice in the Commons that on Thursday he will ask if the proposed site for the Charlottetown station has been decided upon; if so where is the site and when will tenders be called for.

There was a fair attendance at the market yesterday, and prices were the most part in advance of latest previous quotations. Eggs sold for 28 cts, a dozen; butter was 23 to 25 cts, per lb.; pork went to 62 cts, per lb.; oats bought from 40 to 45 cts, a bushel and hay was from 70 to 80 cts, per cwt.

The Attorney General of Manitoba moved his resolution on the extension of the boundaries of Manitoba in the last Legislature last Monday evening. The resolution passed the House unanimously. It is in the form of a memorial praying the Dominion Government to extend the boundaries of the province northward to Hudson's Bay and westward including a considerable portion of the territories of Assiniboia and Saskatchewan.

Lord Minto, former Governor General of Canada, speaking at Missions near Halifax Tuesday night on the proposed Colonial Conference and the question of preferential treatment said Canada could not wait forever and if she received nothing but a bucket of cold water she would be justified in saying there were other opportunities before her. The United States, his Lordship said, was seeking reciprocity with Canada in the hope of stealing her away from Great Britain.

Elvira and Roxanna Hagson, sisters, aged 55 and 60 years respectively, were burned to death in their bed at 23 Union Park St., south end, Boston, early Friday morning. The women occupied a rear room on the first floor of the lodging house. Near their bed was an open grate, from which it is supposed the bed clothing was ignited. The firemen, who responded to the alarm, had little work in extinguishing the flames, which were confined to one room. The bodies of the victims were burned beyond recognition.

The correspondent at Vienna on the London Telegraph relates that the same newspaper correspondent who foretold the murder of King Alexander and Queen Draga three days before it happened now predicts a revolution arising from dissatisfaction with King Peter's Government for its failure to get rid of the regicides. The Telegraph despatch asserts that a pamphlet threatening the massacre of regicides and the dethronement of King Peter has had a tremendous circulation.

A sled upon which were three young sons of P. Chamberlain of the city of Quebec, dashed over the high cliff in the rear of the St. Foye gate on Friday morning. The children were not missed until the afternoon, and were then found lying in a snow drift, at the foot of the cliff. One had apparently been instantly killed, having fallen on a rock; another is dying, and but slight hopes are entertained for the recovery of the third. No one saw the accident. A fourth boy is also feared to be buried in the drift.

In the Supreme Court on Monday, Geo. Masson was put on trial before the Chief Justice and a jury for the murder of Samuel McRae, a fellow patient at Fallowood Asylum. After hearing the evidence of the attendants at the Asylum, Drs. Goodwill and Corroy, the address of counsel and the Judge's charge, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty on the ground of insanity. The case of Michael Power, jr., for assault on police officers was next heard. Evidence as to the prisoner's mental condition was given by Drs. Goodwill, Corroy and Warburton. They all concurred in the contention of prisoner's counsel, Mr. Johnston, that the prisoner was a moral degenerate and insane; consequently not fit to stand trial. Both these prisoners are to be kept in confinement at the pleasure of the Lieutenant Governor.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Tokio advices of the 13th, say: The Japa' cruiser, Tokion, has captured the British steamer Roseley, loaded with coal for Vladivostok.

Hon. Charles Drury, Ontario's first Minister of Agriculture, and Sheriff of Simcoe County, died suddenly at Barrie, Ontario, on the 12th inst., aged 61 years.

The big sugar laden steamer Indus, from Havana for New York, struck hard and fast on Fire Island Bar, during a dense fog, on Thursday last. She was subsequently got off.

A two hundred thousand dollar fire raged in Chelsea, Mass., on Thursday morning last, and Henry Giggey, a fireman, is in the hospital in a dangerous condition. He was struck by a falling wall.

Judge Weatherbie, of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia has been promoted to the Chief Justiceship of that Province. The new Chief Justice is an Islander, being a native of Bedouque, where he was born in 1836.

Thomas Cammack was executed at Woodstock N. B. last Thursday morning for the murder of William Doherty in July last. Father McMurray attended the unfortunate man up to the last and accompanied him to the gallus. The Sheriff was executioner.

The London Standard's St. Petersburg correspondence learns that the Imperial budget of 1905, which certainly contains no expenditures connected with the war in the Far East, will show \$37,500,000 surplus obtained by taxes on alcohol and cotton.

The schooner Onaga which left Lunenburg for Halifax on Dec. 15th. was about given up for lost, when she appeared on Saturday bearing up for Halifax. Unfortunately she ran on the ledge at Thuram Cape about 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon she is in a bad state.

On Saturday night last the mercury sank to 14 degrees below zero at the meteorological office in Charlottetown. During all day Sunday it was about 12 below. It indicated somewhat at night and the coldest registered Sunday night was 10 below. Cold enough for anything, we should think.

Within two minutes after sounding the alarm of fire on Friday last, 638 pupils and 17 teachers of the Puelche Street school, Puelche, were on the street in perfect safety, and without a semblance of panic, thus proving for a third time within a year the efficacy of the system of fire drill recently adopted in the Toronto schools.

John Gardiner an unfortunate workman on the I. C. R. who lost a leg at the Railway Point last August, met another bad accident at Moncton on Saturday that will cripple him for life. He was going up stairs to his work in the car mileage office, when he slipped and fell breaking his other leg near the hip. The fracture is a bad one.

General Stossel and staff arrived at Nagasaki on Saturday from Port Dalny, and were received by a guard of police. Stossel looked well, took up quarters in a bungalow on Iwasaki Hill. The closing act of the great drama, caused a feeling of sadness, which was not dispelled by glorious weather and the reception accorded the Russians by the Japs.

A London despatch of the 16th says: A fierce gale is causing havoc along the coasts of the United Kingdom. Numerous wrecks and loss of lives have occurred. The str. Katich was driven ashore on the Isle of Wight, and five were drowned. All the arrivals report terrific weather. Fifty steamers have sought shelter at Holyhead. It was blizzed cold this morning, accompanied by gales, and the first snowing of winter commenced in Lincolnshire.

Mrs. Holmes Smith, aged 50, died at Otterbrook, Stewiacke, N.S. on Monday in consequence of severe burns received on the previous night. She was sitting before the fire reading, waiting for the return of her son who was out. Her husband and other children were in bed. Her husband was aroused by her screams and rushing to the kitchen found her clothes a mass of flames. He wrapped blankets around her and smothered the flames; but she only lived a few hours in great pain.

We much regret the death of Mr. Martin Simon, of Morell, notice of whose demise appears in our obituary column to-day. Mr. Simon's life years was spent for the most part in that community, and his manly Christian virtues, honesty and integrity, won and retained for him the esteem and respect of his large circle of friends and acquaintances. He reared a large family, and established a large and comfortable household. He was a faithful member of the Liberal-Conservative party. He will be much missed in the community in which he lived. The unusually large concourse of people attending his funeral attested the esteem in which he was held by all classes of the community. His bereaved widow and other members of his family have our sympathy in their hour of trial.
