

CANADA.

A laundry is to be started in Winnipeg.

An Odd-fellow's Hall is to be erected in Brockville at a cost of \$10,000.

The Good Templar Lodge in Winnipeg recently initiated fifteen candidates in one night.

The protest against the return of Mr. James Trow, M. P. for South Perth has been withdrawn.

A public reading and lecture room association has been formed in St. Thomas, the capital of Ontario.

Mr. Irnie, editor and proprietor of the Guelph Mercury, has returned home after a short tour in Europe.

A dispatch from Fort Garry dated 29th Oct. says that the Red River is frozen over and navigation closed.

A plot of fifteen acres of land on the Richmond road, two miles from the city of Ottawa, changed hands a few days ago at \$250 per acre.

Messrs Montgomery, Haythorne, Haveland and Howland have been appointed Senators from Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Isaac Carling has been appointed trustee for the London, Huron and Bruce Railway, on the Board of Trustees, in room of Mr. Harris, who resigned.

Mr. Matthew Hutchinson has been appointed to the Montreal Flour Inspection, in place of Hon. John Young.

Mr. Hutchinson was formerly deputy.

A cable telegram has been received announcing the death, in London, of Mr. Wm. Dixon, Chief Dominion Emigration Agent in Great Britain.

Mr. Dixon was a faithful and energetic officer, whose place will not be easily filled.

The late fire in the interior of Pine River has damaged the dam erected by Mr. J. Bradley to such an extent that work has been suspended, and there is some talk of the project being abandoned.

The government have, as might be expected, ignored Hon. John Young's claims to the Flour Inspection in Montreal, and have appointed Matthew Hutchinson, formerly Mr. Young's deputy, to the office.

Mr. Bellarose, M. P. for Laval, having threatened to vote against the government on the Pacific Railway, the matter has been elevated to the Senate, and Mr. Oumet, a ministerialist, elected in his place.

H. S. Macdonald, M. P. P., has been appointed Junior Judge of Lewis and Grenville. In view of the Dominion Government being defeated all their office seeking friends are making sure of their appointment at once.

Mr. Oumet, a Government supporter, has been elected in Laval County, Province of Quebec. He started for Ottawa immediately after the election and was chosen and the result. It is likely that every vote will count at the capital just now.

A Highlandman over 100 years of age appeared at the Elgin County assizes the other day as a witness. He gave his evidence in his native Gaelic without hesitation and exhibited in a remarkable degree the powers of a good memory at a very advanced age.

The consecration of the Rev. Mr. Faugere, as Missionary Bishop of Algona, took place in St. James Cathedral, Toronto, on Tuesday, 28th ult. Mr. Faugere is understood to be an earnest, active clergyman, and it is to be hoped that as Bishop he will do much good.

Mr. John Inkster of Manitoba was in a canoe duck shooting, the other day, accompanied by a half-breed. A spark from the gun set fire to a considerable amount of powder they had with them. The canoe was blown to pieces, and the eyes of the half-breed were badly injured. Mr. Inkster escaped with burnt hands and face.

James C. Wall, of Oshawa, was sentenced, at St. Catharines, to be hanged on the 30th December, for the heinous crime of rape, perpetrated on a little girl named Lavenworth in July last. His Lordship, Judge Morrison, in passing the sentence, gave the prisoner to understand that he would not expect a commutation of his sentence.

At the recent exhibition of the Maritime Agricultural Society, held at Village la Prairie, Mr. Kenneth Mackenzie, of Hat Creek, late of Poulton to ship, Ont., the most extensive farmer in Manitoba, took no less than 72 prizes, chiefly in horses, cattle, grain, roots, and specialties. We understand that Mr. Mackenzie will realize some \$5,000 from his farm this year.

The Town Council of Ingersoll have purchased a new rotary system fire engine from the Sibby manufacturing Company, Seneca Falls, N. Y. The price to be paid for the engine and one hundred feet of hose, is \$4,700, Canadian currency, cash. The manufacturers claim that the machine will throw 600 gallons per minute in a horizontal stream of from 250 to 260 feet and a perpendicular stream of 300 feet.

It is satisfactory to find in an English commercial journal such a statement as this: "Canadian buyers are coming forward freely, and the quality of the latest arrivals is excellent." The prices quoted in London for our butter are, Fine 110s to 112s, good 108s, and other qualities 6s. to 80s. We have no doubt that the "inspiration" movement, which originated in this County last fall, and the free discussion of the butter question which it occasioned, are the chief cause of this improved quality in Canadian butter.

Mr. Duncan Kippen carried off most of the prizes for displays of strength, &c., at the Canadian games in Toronto last week. This is not to be wondered at. Going into the blacksmith's shop of the Messrs. Kippen the other day, and seeing the "bones of contention" which we had the curiosity to inquire their respective weights and heights, the result of which we had, and think it cannot be matched in the Dominion. The Messrs. Kippen are surely respectable descendants of the old Scotch and the Fair Maid of Perth. There are five men engaged in the shop, and these are their weights and heights:—Mr. Duncan Kippen, height 6 feet 4 inches, weight 275 lbs.; Mr. John Kippen, height 6 feet 4 inches, weight 220 lbs.; Mr. James Kippen, 6 feet 5 inches in height, weight 187 lbs.; Mr. Alex. Ross, 5 feet 9 inches in height, weight 176 lbs.; Mr. Wm. Ross, 5 feet 11 inches in height, weight 161 lbs.—Woodstock Times.

Rev. Narayan Sheehar, of Bombay, has been preaching and lecturing in Hamilton and Toronto lately, and has attracted large audiences. He is a native Hindoo, and was born a Brahmin, but about 20 years ago, when about 20 years old, was converted to Christianity, and has since been laboring among his countrymen as a missionary, with much success. In Toronto the reverend missionary appeared in a dress which it is impossible to describe properly, but consisting of a garment of white muslin, partially covered by a coat of grey cloth. He wore a large turban of white muslin, which he kept on his head throughout the service except during prayer. His English was remarkably good, and he surprised his hearers by his acquaintance with our literature. He was a delegate from British India to the late New York Evangelical Conference, and is now on a missionary tour for the benefit of his village in India, which contains a Christian population of 400.

At the Waterloo County Amuse, held at Berlin, a few days ago, the greatest part of the day was taken up with the Orie. Can. case of *Exeter v. York*, which excited intense interest, and was held in a crowded court. Plaintiff is County Attorney of Wellington county, his wife's daughter of Sheriff Orange of that county, and the defendant a doctor practicing in Guelph. Defendant was charged with having had an intimate intercourse with plaintiff's wife at Preston and Berlin in the summer of 1872. The criminal case, *Exeter v. York*, was not proved, but the circumstance of defendant's wife was so strong that the jury returned a verdict against him. Both plaintiff and defendant, who is not present, are widowers, have families, and the case altogether was of a very painful nature. A number of persons, who were at the York Assize, held in Toronto, in which 20,000 persons were awarded to the Government, were invited to the Amuse.


