The Pilot Boat.

The damaged pilot boat which is
now at John Taylor's wharf is beyond
repair and is being stripped there.
Some men from Quidi Vidi secured the
blocks and other gear, and the anchor-
s, chains, etc., were all saved. The
Board of Pilot Commissioners will
hold an enquiry into the loss of the
vessel, and it is likely that a steamer
will be procured for the pilots in the
future. When the "Pilot" was drif-
ting on the rocks had any accident
occurred to the boat towing behind
all on board would have been drown-
ed, as they could not swim through
the heavy surf which was running on
the rocks. The Pilot was running
two years and was a very good ves-
sel for the work. Engineer Ring will
be the chief loser by the accident,
being thrown out of work. He, how-
ever, has proved himself to be a good,
reliable man, and if a steamer is put
in commission no doubt will get his
position back.

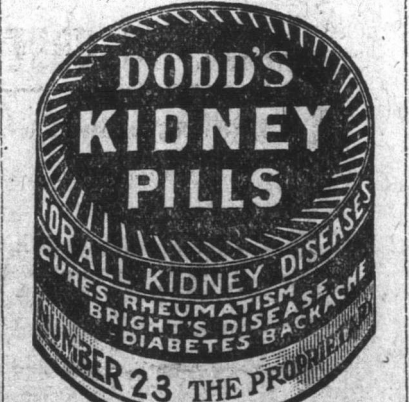
