## His Excellency and Lady Return.

The Allan boat Mongolian arriving here from Liverpool at 8.15 last night brought their Excellencies Governor Williams and Lady Williams accompanied by Private Secretary Fitzherbert and A. D. C. Lieut. Gale. When the ship entered the Narrows a salute of 17 guns was fired from H. M. S. warship Brilliant lying in the harbor, and rockets were sent up from the Mongolian. A large number of citizens went down to the pier to welcome them. His Excellency who was on the bridge said to the crowd on the wharf: "I am glad, my people, to be with you once more." This was followed by three cheers. When the gangway was laid His Excellency the Administration Sir W. H. Horwood, Hon. D. Morrison, Hon. R. Watson, Hon. R. K. Bishop, Capt. Woolcombe and Capt. Atley went on board and greeted the vice-regal party and shortly afterwards accompanied them ashore. When the Governor stepped on the wharf he was cheered again while the C. C. C. Band rendered stirring and appropriate music. A guard of honour from the Constabulary under Inspector General Sullivan and Supt. Grimes lined the passages up to the brougham in waiting. The band played the National Anthem as their Excellencies entered the carriage and were driven to Government House accompanied by Sir William Horwood.

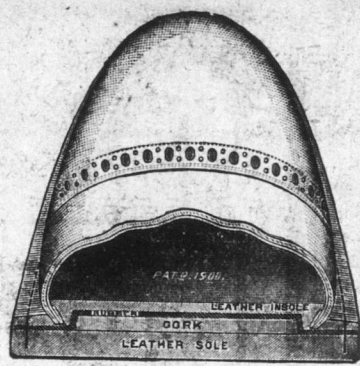

## Home Rule Scheme.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.  
The Home Rule scheme has been under secret preparation for some time past at the hands of Asquith, Birrell, Simon and other prominent members of the House of Commons. The financial features of the scheme are attracting the attention of all parties. The theory has been current that Parliament will be asked to launch the Irish Government with a subsidy estimated at from \$75,000,000 to \$150,000,000. The Treasury estimates that the Irish expenditure exceeds the revenue by \$6,500,000 annually. The Nationalists consider this an exaggeration by at least \$1,500,000. They contend that the Irish deficits are due to extravagant expenses imposed by Parliament, notably those attached to the Constabulary; and the alternative suggested to a lump sum is that the Government maintain some item of Irish expense. The cost of Old Age Pensions is the item principally mentioned. Reports credit the Committee in charge of the Home Rule scheme as endorsing this. The best opinion is that the Imperial Parliament will keep control of the Irish Customs and Excise; thus securing a general system for the United Kingdom and preventing Ireland from raising a protective wall against England as the largest colonies have done.

## Rebels Do Not Trust the Throne

Special Evening Telegram.

PEKIN, To-day.  
Fighting between the rebels and the Imperial forces continue. Late advices indicate that Hankow city was not retaken by the Imperialists, although they captured the railway station. The Associated Press correspondent has sent no word for two days and this may indicate that the censor will not permit him to report unfavourable news. Meantime there are serious dangers along the railway line between the War Minister's position and Pekin. Disaffection among troops and people has prevented satisfactory communication between the various sections of the army. Yuan Shi Kai started for the front yesterday. The policy he will adopt is eagerly awaited. Negotiations looking for a settlement have been under way between Kai and the revolutionary leaders but the latter are confident of their strength, and have expressed themselves as having little faith in the promises of the Throne. Americans are holding a meeting in the Legation to-day to decide upon definite measures for their own protection. Foreign troops are guarding the Mission houses.

## More Garri-sons Revolt.

PEKIN, To-day.  
It is reported that the garri-sons at Tsinan Fu Chanchung, Paoting Fu and Tchchow have declared in favour of the revolutionists. Kai Feng is expected to revolt shortly. The revolt at Paoting Fu will be of great importance, as it would have the result of cutting Tchchang's communications completely.
