Thoughts Upon the Times.

In the passing of John Redmond,
the great Irish Statesman, the Imper-
ial Parliament of Great Britain loses
one of its most influential members
and Ireland its greatest friend. He
was Ireland's most faithful servant,
and in this her darkest hour, will be
sorely missed.

What a pity it is that we allow
that good old word "servant" to be re-
garded with reproach. Originally it
meant the subject of a King, or one
who yielded obedience to another. In
scripture it is used to denote one who
is employed in accomplishing God's
purposes. Every one who is worth
anything is a servant. The doctor
serves his patients, the merchant serves
his customers, the lawyer serves his
clients, and the clergymen serves his
parishioners. In short service is life.
It is only when we are doing some-
thing worth while, something to fur-
ther the aims of the world towards the
betterment of mankind, that we are
entitled to live in the world. Jesus
Christ himself came into the world
"not to be ministered unto, but to
minister." John Redmond spent his
life for Ireland. He was Ireland's
greatest and most faithful servant.

The world is fast losing sight of the
word "service" and is substituting for
it in very opposite "selfishness." But
when the selfish man passes off the
stage of life he is never missed, but
the honest, upright servant always is.
It is extremely amusing to notice
how some of the politicians and new-
papers of St. John's try to exploit the
sealers from the outposts for their
own political purposes. The men them-
selves should resent this. These seal-
ers' meetings have had but one aim—
the furtherance of the schemes of the
politician. Will any of the politicians
explain to the sealers at the big meet-
ing planned for Friday evening, why
\$14 per qtl. was not paid for fish last
fall, and how much the members of the
Tonnage Committee and Mr. H. D.
Reid got for the fish sold the Italian
Government last year.

They might explain what efforts Mr.
Coaker made to have his erstwhile
"grahal" opponent, Sir Edward Mor-
ris, elevated to the peerage, and
whether he has paid or intends pay-
ing Lord Morris \$10,000 a year to re-
main in England.

They might also explain why it is
the Royal Naval Reserve only get 40
cents per day when they were prom-
ised and actually paid for two months
at \$1.10 per day. These things are
more important to the country just
now than "Union Fire," or the big
premises at Catalina.

The struggle between the nations of
the world for universal peace shows
no sign of abatement. Judging from
the messages coming in from the seat
of war the end is not yet in sight. In
Russia, "mobocracy" has given place
to subservience to the German War
lois.

We must not forget that Russia was
the cause of the present great world
war. England and France would not
have gone to war with Germany but
for Russia, yet to-day she is to all in-
tents and purposes the greatest ally
that Germany has. It would be much
better for Europe and the world at
large if the Russian Empire was dis-
membered. We know not what the fu-
ture has in store for us but we may
rest assured that Divine Providence
is behind this great world conflict, and
that better laws for the protection and
guidance of mankind will be the re-
sult.

Outside our walls, and though but

day."
