

To-day's Messages.

NOT HURRYING TO WORK.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 17. While operators and union leaders had predicted a resumption to-day of mining on a large scale in the Bituminous Coal Fields of the country, where more than four hundred thousand miners have been on strike for sixteen days, only in West Virginia are both sides confident that all the men would be back at work during the day.

MORE SHIPS FOR BRITAIN.

PARIS, Nov. 17. The Supreme Council, to-day, decided that the old tank steamers Germany is now surrendering, be taken to the Firth of Forth and entrusted to the guardianship of Great Britain.

OMSK EVACUATED.

OMSK, Nov. 9. Omsk was evacuated to-day by the military staff and the civilians, which still remained in the all Russian capital. The Government is going direct to Irkutsk, and it is expected it will be established in that city by November 16. Admiral Kolchak, head of the Government, remained with his armies. The Bolsheviks occupy points on both the railway lines approximately 160 miles west of Omsk.

FRENCH ELECTION RETURNS.

PARIS, Nov. 17. Returns from Sunday's elections for the Chamber of Deputies, thus far received, show the Conservatives, Nationalists and Moderates far in the lead, these parties winning 191 seats in 206 constituencies, for which complete figures have been received. The extreme Socialists received a severe setback throughout the country, and in general the Socialists suffered the defeat of many of their leaders.

ANOTHER BANK RAID.

RANDOLPH, Mass., Nov. 17. The Randolph Saving Bank was raided to-day by four armed men who bound Treasurer N. Irving Tolman, a woman clerk and a customer, stripped the vault of bonds, cash and valuables estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000, and fled in an automobile in which they had come. They left no clue except the automobile registry number, which is assigned to a man at Greenfield. The men were of foreign extraction. Treasurer Tolman said. Depositors are protected against the loss, according to the Treasurer.

BELGIAN CABINET RESIGNS.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 17. The Belgian Cabinet has tendered its resignation and King Albert has asked the members of the ministry to continue in office until the results of Sunday's elections are definitely known. The Belgian Cabinet, under the Premiership of M. Delacroix, took office in November 1918. The Ministry is composed of members of the various political parties.

CANADA'S VICTORY LOAN.

TORONTO, Nov. 17. The Dominion of Canada Victory Loan now reaches \$672,000,000.

MAKING PROGRESS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. There were evidences of real progress to-day in the wage scale negotiations between coal miners and operators of the Central Competitive Fields. Although no meeting of the Joint Wage Scale Committee was held

the conference was postponed until to-morrow at the request of the operators, who spent the day preparing a report of the demands of the workers.

CONSISTORY APPOINTMENTS.

ROME, Nov. 17. The Vatican will officially call the next consistory in the middle of December. Besides the new Cardinals, it is already known, the Pope will create Monsignor Soldevilla Romero, Archbishop of Saragossa, and Monsignor Dalbor, Archbishop of Posen, will be elected to the Cardinalate. Monsignor Bortram, Archbishop of Breslau, whose elevation to the Cardinalate was reserved in the consistory of 1916, will also be made a Cardinal.

RESOLUTION REJECTED.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. The Blanket Resolution of the Foreign Relations Committee, to preclude from the jurisdiction of the League of Nations all questions affecting "honor on its vital interests," of the United States was defeated to-day in the Senate. The resolution, the last of the committee list, was rejected by the committee vote of administration democrats and the mild reservation Republicans by 56 to 36.

A KNOCK FOR BULLITT.

LONDON, Nov. 17. Premier Lloyd George, speaking in the House of Commons to-day, during the course of the debate on Russia, dwelt upon the complexity of the Russian problem. "Which ever direction we go," he said, "we are marching into a fog." The Premier was asked concerning the testimony given before the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations by Wm. C. Bullitt, recently attached to the American Peace Commission, and replied, "I never heard of Bullitt until he returned from Russia. I never knew of his existence until one day President Wilson said to me, 'there is a young fellow returned from Russia who might be able to give you interesting views about Russia.' "But, he added, that I was not to attach too much importance to him." After declaring that Bullitt had "betrayed the confidence" of Mr. Lloyd George's Secy., Sir Philip Kerr, and states that his Secretary saw hundreds of people for him, including Bullitt, and had never referred to Bullitt, the Premier continued, "Bullitt got hold of documents in the office of the American Delegation in Paris, and published them. No public man in England would have soiled his fingers by using evidence of this kind."

NEW IRISH BILL.

LONDON, Nov. 17. A Bill, embodying the Cabinet Committee's report on Ireland, is nearly ready, and will be presented in the House of Commons in about a fortnight, says the Daily Mail. It adds that the Chief Secy. for Ireland, J. S. MacPherson, has told friends that the scheme for two Legislatures, with a Supreme Central Senate, has been unanimously approved by the Committee and accepted by the Cabinet, and that the recent statement that the Committee had presented majority and minority reports were untrue.

ENJOYING HIMSELF.

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, West V.A., Nov. 17. After three days spent in golfing and tramping over the pine clad mountains of West Virginia, the Prince of Wales left this quiet little place to-night for New York. There he faces a strenuous programme of public receptions and entertainments, lasting until the moment he sails for England, next Saturday. The Prince spent practically the whole of the last day of his vacation on the golf links. In the evening he was entertained at a tea and dance and the Prince danced until the last moment before train time.

DENEKINE MAKES CAPTURE.

LONDON, Nov. 17. General Denekine, anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, according to a Moscow wireless message, has captured the staff of General Simon Petlura, the Ukrainian leader. General Petlura is missing the message adds.

AN APOLOGY.

LONDON, Nov. 17. James Ian Macpherson, Chief Secy. for Ireland, has apologized to Jeremiah Macveagh, Nationalist member for South Down, Ireland, withdrawing the imputation that Macveagh was a Sinn Fein sympathizer.

SURPRISE ELECTION.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 17. Although the definite results of the Parliamentary Elections of Sunday will probably not be known before Wednesday, Socialists claim a gain of twenty five seats, mostly from the Catholic party, which apparently is losing ground everywhere. The Liberals are losing less than was expected.

REGULAR DONATION TO CEASE.

LONDON, Nov. 17. Andrew Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons to-day that the Government had decided to discontinue the unemployment donation to civilians, beginning November 21. The donation will continue for former service men and women up to the end of March, at a rate of twenty shillings weekly to men and fifteen shillings to women, for a maximum period of nine weeks.

TURKEY MUST REMAIN.

LONDON, Nov. 17. A. J. Balfour, Lord President of the Council, pointed out in the House of Commons to-day that while there was much criticism of the Government for lack of a clear-cut policy on Russia, none of the critics had ever suggested a clear-cut policy of their own. Turning to other questions, he said it was a profound misfortune for the peoples of the Near East that the

Peace Conference had failed to settle their future, but it was because of the fact that until America had given a clear lead as to her policy, it was quite impossible that the common policy of all the Associated Powers, of which America was the most important, could be submitted in a clear-cut line to her. Mr. Balfour declined to believe that Turkey could be wiped off the map.

STANDING OF DEPUTIES.

PARIS, Nov. 15. It is believed that the new Chamber of Deputies, in which no party will have an absolute majority, will consist of from eighty to eighty-five members of the Catholic party, sixty to sixty-five Socialists, thirty-five to forty Liberals, and five to ten members elected from smaller political groups.

LATEST RETURNS.

Complete returns from the French elections show that the Conservative, Moderate and Nationalist element hold 494 seats in the Chamber of Deputies, while the Extremists will have fifty-four members of the new chamber. Of this number 221 were former Deputies, while 327 are men who have not hitherto been members of chamber.

WILSON OUT OF DOORS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. For the first time since his return to Washington on Sept. 23 from his Western tour, which was cut short by a sudden attack of illness, President Wilson went outside of the White House. He was rolled into the grounds on a wheel chair, and for more than an hour enjoyed the fresh air and sunshine.

MAJESTIC THEATRE

Nfld. Schooner Sunk in Collision.

New York, November 14.—After a voyage of 1,500 miles, the 310 ton Newfoundland schooner Attainment was rammed and sunk by a Spanish steamer in the harbor of Cadiz last September on the eve of her return home. The yarn was spun here to-day by members of her crew who arrived on the Italian steamship Casoria.

The last voyage of the Attainment began early in the present year when she sailed from St. John's, Newfoundland with a cargo of dried fish for Brazil. There she loaded with coffee and made an English port where a cargo of coal for Spain was offered and accepted. It was then September, and her skipper, Captain Mercer, contracted to load and deliver a cargo of salt for the fish packers of his native shores.

The eve of the sailing day had arrived and with visions of Christmas at home on their minds, the crew of the schooner was looking forward to a last voyage across the Atlantic

when along came disaster in the form of a Spanish ship. None of the crew were injured.
